Strong low pressure system moving across southern Canada produced a tight surface pressure gradient over North Dakota. Wind speeds averaged 50 to 70 miles an hour beginning early in the day and ending late in the evening. Overall, wind damage was minimal, however one semi-truck, which was empty, was blown over on its side along Interstate 94 in Bismarck. In Jamestown a power outage occurred, but just for a short time period. Other locations reported loose objects were tossed around in the wind.
