D. INLAND FLOODING...

WAKULLA...SIGNIFICANT INLAND FLOODING OCCURRED FROM VERY HEAVY RAINFALL ON MONDAY JUNE 25. RAINFALL CAUSED NUMEROUS SMALL CREEKS...STREAMS...AND RIVERS IN WAKULLA COUNTY TO RAPIDLY EXCEED THEIR BANKS AND FLOOD ADJACENT COMMUNITIES. THE SOPCHOPPY RIVER CRESTED AT 36.8 FEET ON TUESDAY JUNE 26TH. THIS IS THE FLOOD OF RECORD FOR THE SOPCHOPPY. NUMEROUS HOMES WERE IMPACTED BY FLOOD WATERS...SOME UP TO THE SECOND STORY. TWO BRIDGES WERE DAMAGED BY FLOOD WATERS. NUMEROUS ROADS AROUND THE COUNTY WERE WASHED OUT OR CLOSED DURING THE PEAK OF THE STORM. OVER 271 STRUCTURES WERE IMPACTED BY FLOOD WATERS TO SOME DEGREE IN WAKULLA COUNTY. OF THESE...21 MOBILE HOMES WERE DESTROYED...17 SINGLE FAMILY HOMES

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LEON...SEVERAL ROADS IN THE SOUTHERN PORTION OF LEON COUNTY WERE WASHED OUT OR CLOSED DUE TO FLOOD WATERS.

FRANKLIN...SEVERAL ROADS ACROSS THE NORTHERN PORTION OF THE COUNTY FLOODED DUE TO HEAVY RAINFALL.

JEFFERSON...A FEW ROADS FLOODED DUE TO HEAVY RAINFALL ON MONDAY JUNE 26TH. MOST NOTABLE WAS HIGHWAY 27 WEST OF HIGHWAY 19 WAS CLOSED FOR A BRIEF TIME DUE TO FLOODING.

MADISON...WATER FROM A RETENTION POND SURROUNDED A RESIDENCE NEAR THE CITY OF MADISON.

DIXIE...SEVERAL ROADS NORTH OF CROSS CITY EXPERIENCED FLOODING. RIVER FLOODING ALONG THE STEINHATCHEE RIVER IMPACTED AT LEAST 40 HOMES.

LAFAYETTE...HIGHWAY 51 SOUTH FLOODED ON TUESDAY JUNE 27TH. THE STEINHATCHEE RIVER NEARLY OVERTOPPED THE BRIDGE OVER HIGHWAY 51 IN THE SOUTHERN PORTION OF THE COUNTY.

LOWNDES...MINOR FLOODING REPORTED IN SOUTHERN LOWNDES COUNTY IN LAKE PARK.
