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Good Fishing Opener Seen Despite Flooding

Despite the flood, a cold spring and high water on creeks earlier, there will be good fishing for Southeastern Minnesota residents Saturday, the opening day of the 1965 fishing season. Thirty thousand fishable size brown trout from the Lanesboro trout hatchery have been stocked in the trout streams and creeks of ten Southeastern Minnesota counties during the past two weeks for Saturday's opening. The fish run four to five pounds, seven to nine inches.
THE DROP of four feet in the Mississippi since its flood peak has cleared the water and made accessible many places for the general opening of the Mississippi River zone, which also is on Saturday. The river area from track to track opens immediately after midnight, trout fishing not until 10 a.m. Saturday CST.
Fishermen may take from the river by hook and line all game fish including bass, northern, walleye, sauger and panfish, plus rough fish, such as carp and sheepshead. The limit on walleye in the river zone is six, it drops to five for bass. Trout experienced a bad winter,

with a destructive spring break-up, according to Russell Hanson, state supervisor of fisheries for this corner of the state. An early destructive flood, which carried out the ice, crushed and buried the carry-over trout.
There will be "put and lake" fishing in Dushee Creek, near Lanesboro, and at several points along the Whitewater. Minnesota allows 10 trout a day.
ALL TROUT streams in Southeastern Minnesota area have been stocked with the first unit of the streams quota for 1965. Heavily fished streams are stocked several times each season.
There will be a minimum of boat fishing on the river. Many of the harbors, including the large one in Winona, still are floodbound and their facilities not in operation. Most boat launching ramps still are under water. The main stream of the river carries a powerful current that can whip an underpowered boat around like a log. The locks of the navigation dams are not in operation. The first towboat to return to the river is scheduled for two weeks in the future.
In other words, it will be hazardous to fish from a sail or common fishing boat below any of the dams for a half mile. Fish probably also are avoiding such current.
Most river fishermen plan on selecting calmer waters: They believe fish have retreated to the sheltered water areas or the back waters. Food is plentiful in the river.

THE WATER is quite clear and cold. Ice was piled along the spillway of the Trempealeau Dam Wednesday. Fishing barges at Alma will be accessible.
Weather predictions — clear and slightly cooler for the week — should offset unfavorable fishing conditions. It should be an enjoyable weekend for the river fisherman.
Sheriff George Fort, in charge of the river patrol in the Winona area of the Mississippi, lifted the ban on river motorboating today. He cautioned boaters to stay away from sandbag dikes and to use the utmost care. At the present stage the river still is dangerous.
All of the counties of Southeastern Minnesota are still on standard time — not daylight. The season for trout opens at 10 a.m. CST.

River Will Be Back Under 13 Wednesday

The Mississippi River has dropped five feet in the past 10 days.
At noon today the stage was 15.75, 57 of a foot under Thursday's noon reading of 16.32 and five feet below the April 20 crest of 20.75.
The Weather Bureau announced the following expected stages for the next five days:
Saturday 15.4
Sunday 14.8
Monday 14.2
Tuesday 13.3
Wednesday 12.7

The extended forecast for the next five days indicates temperatures will be 4 to 8 degrees above normal and that precipitation may range up to half an inch in several periods of showers during the first part of next week.
Normal daytime highs at this time of the year are 62 to 67 and nighttime lows are 39-42. After rising to a mid-summer temperature, the thermometer

dropped to 54 overnight and was 73 at noon today.
THURSDAY'S warm sun drew students to Lake Winona shores for sunbathing and drove all thoughts of flood-fighting into the background.
Thursday's high of 81 compared with the record of 90 for April 30 set in 1952.
A year ago today the city's high was 49 and the low 40. On that day .33 of an inch of rain fell. All-time high for the day was 90, also in 1952, and the low 17 in 1903, 1908 and 1956. Mean for the past 24 hours was 62, contrasting sharply with a normal mean of 53.
The thermometer shot up to 87 at Redwood Falls and was 83 at Duluth and Alexandria. Rochester posted a high of 74 Thursday afternoon and a low of 50 this morning while La Crosse had figures of 80 and 49 for the same times.
Lowest reading in the state was Bemidji's 32 today. Duluth had 39.

Man Who Fell Into Hot Water Remains Serious: A 24-year-old Winona man still was in serious condition today at Community Memorial Hospital with burns on his right arm and leg and chest but was making satisfactory improvement, his doctor reported.
James Mathews, 812 W. Howard St., received the burns in an accident Wednesday at 6 p.m. at the Federal Sunbeam Bakery, 101 E. 3rd St., where he works as a maintenance man.
ACCORDING to production manager Donald Hess, Mathews was attempting to fish a fan blade out of a tank of hot water where it had been placed to loosen the grease on it when he slipped and fell into the five-foot-deep tank.
Mathews had climbed onto the edge of the tank to try to get the fan blade out with a long handled hook, Hess said, instead of using the overhead pulley-and-hook apparatus which could be operated by a man standing on the floor.
The maintenance man escaped more serious injury when his slip landed him on cake pans piled in the tub to within a few inches of the surface, Hess said. Otherwise, Mathews would probably have been completely submerged in the tank, which is about 6 1/2 feet long and 4 feet wide, according to Hess.
The water in the tub is heated to 195 degrees, Hess said; and a chemical detergent is placed in it to aid the food-and-grease-losing action of the water. Fortunately, this detergent had lost most of its strength by the time Mathews had his accident; he received no chemical burns, Hess said.
MATHIEWS pulled himself out of the tank after the slip, Hess said. Fellow employees took him to the hospital where it was discovered that he had suffered first- and second-degree burns on his right arm and leg and second-degree burns on his chest.
(Second degree burns are more serious than first degree.) Mathews' eyes were not af-
