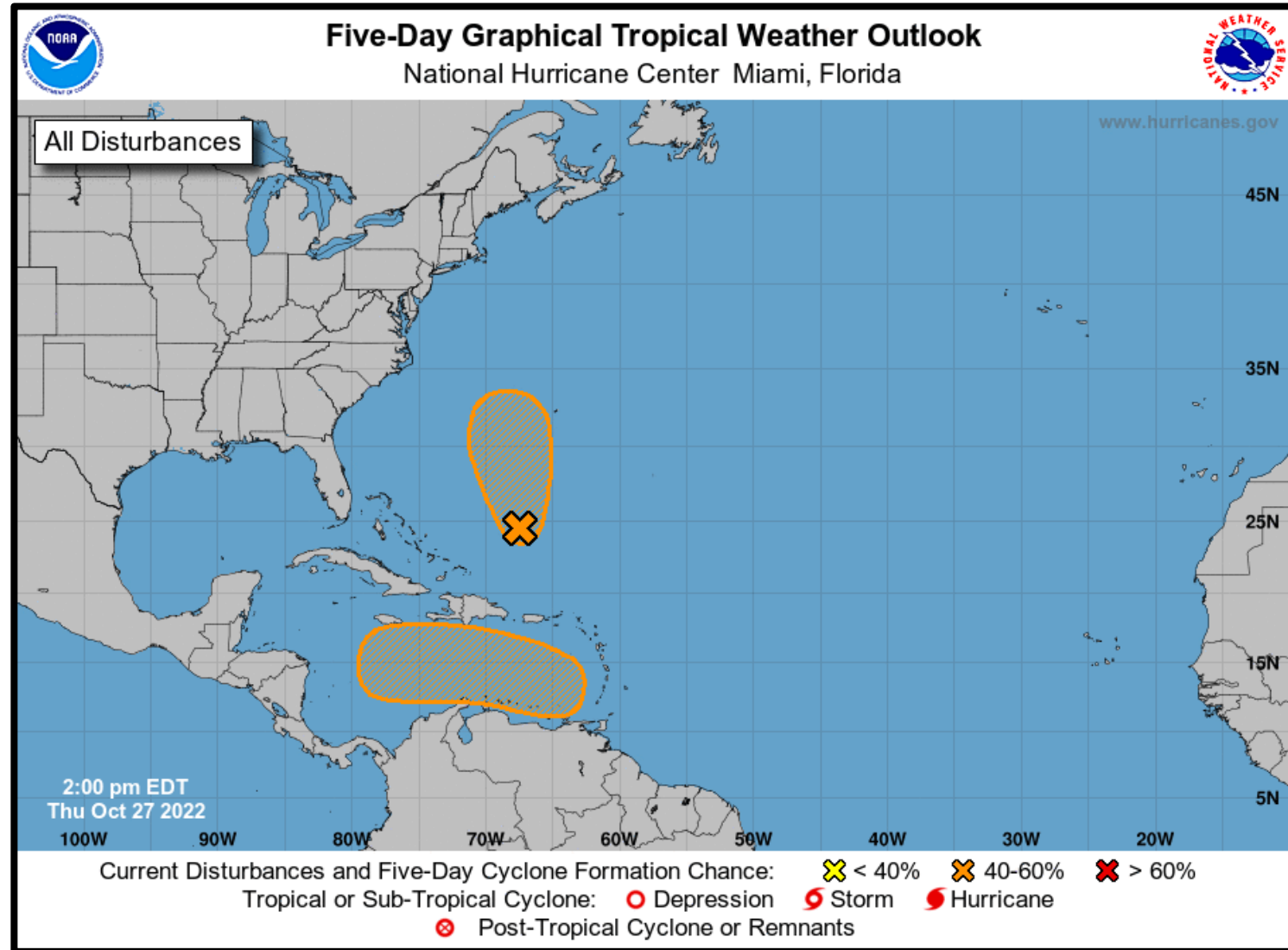

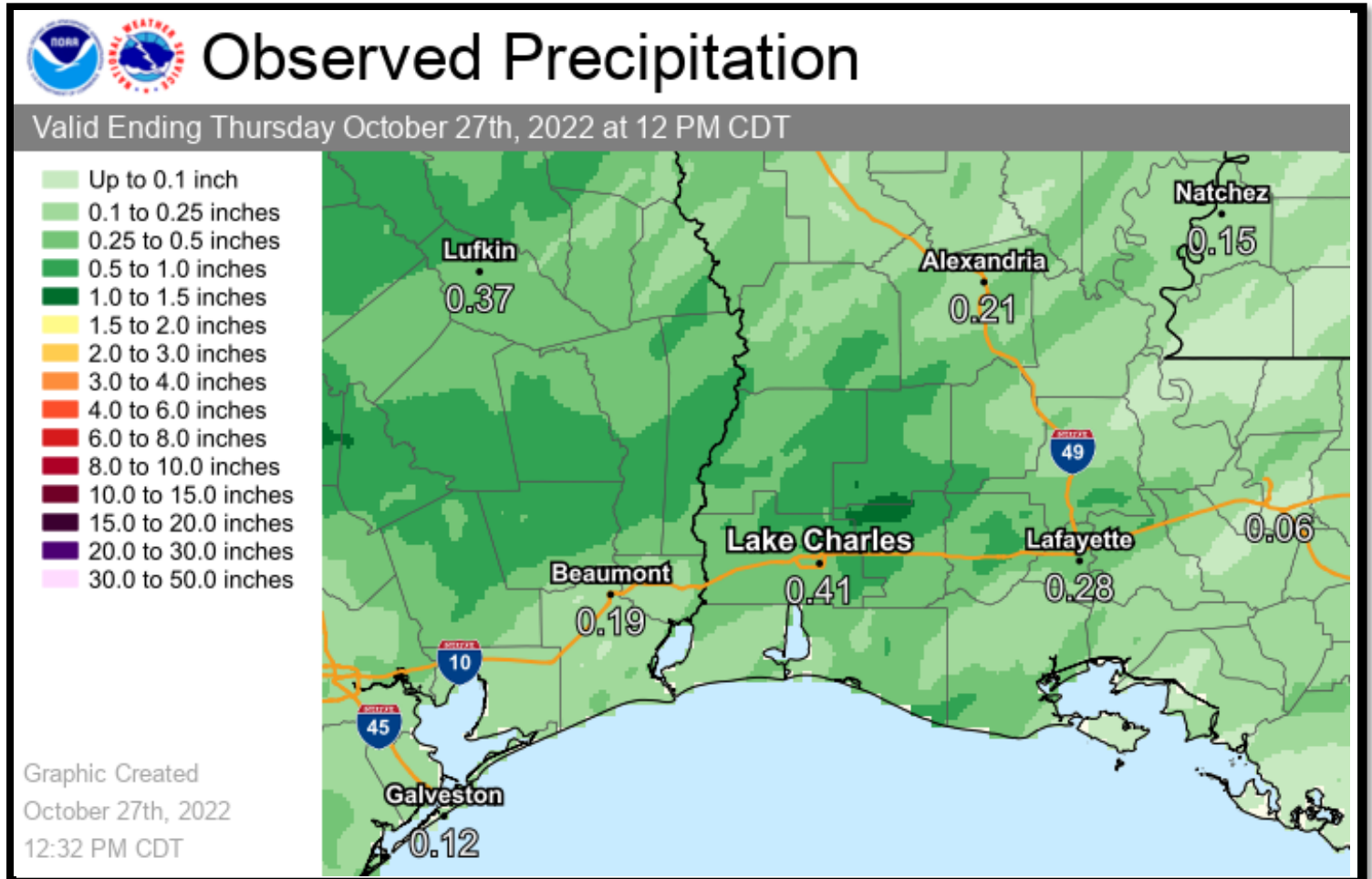
Showers and thunderstorms expected going into the weekend. Dry and seasonal conditions by Sunday into early next week.

Two disturbances are being monitored for possible tropical development. No impacts are expected for our area at this time.



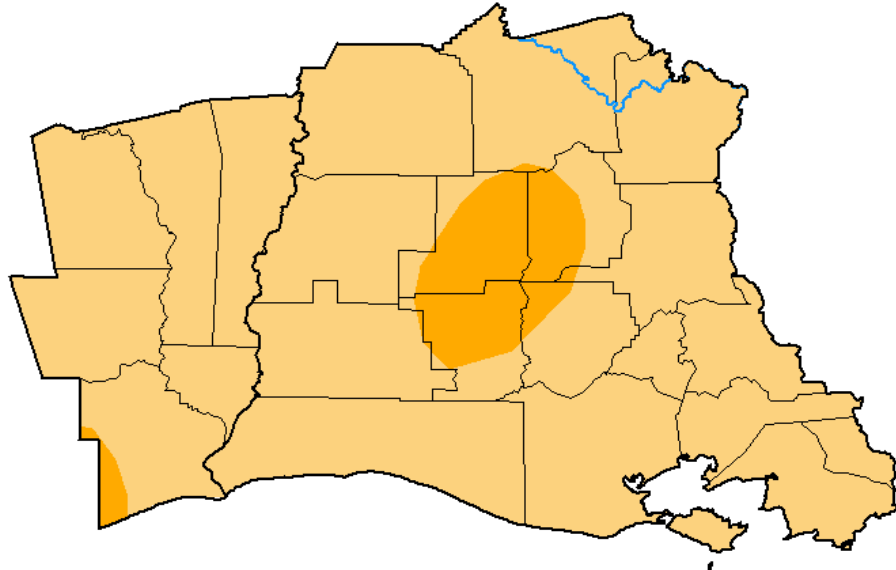
At least a tenth of an inch of rain fell across the area, with portions of SE Texas and SW Louisiana receiving between 0.5 and 1 inch.

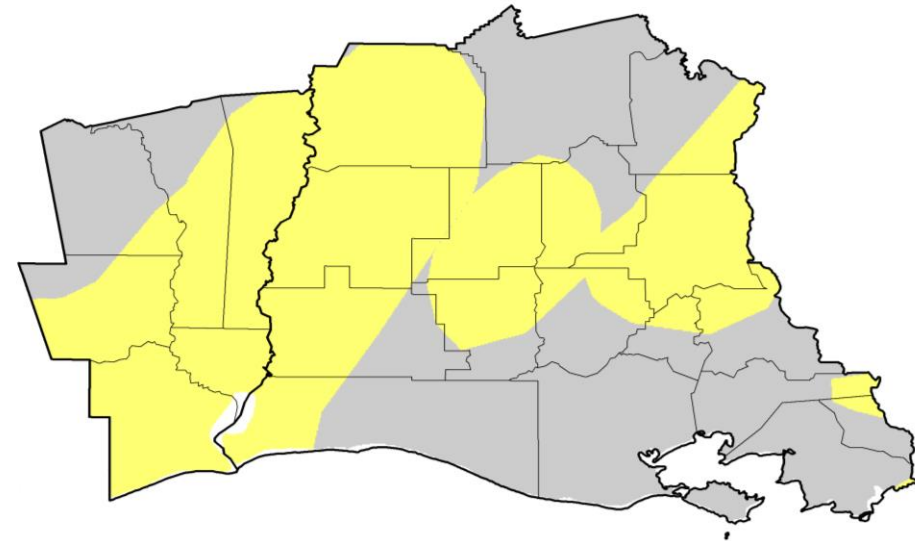

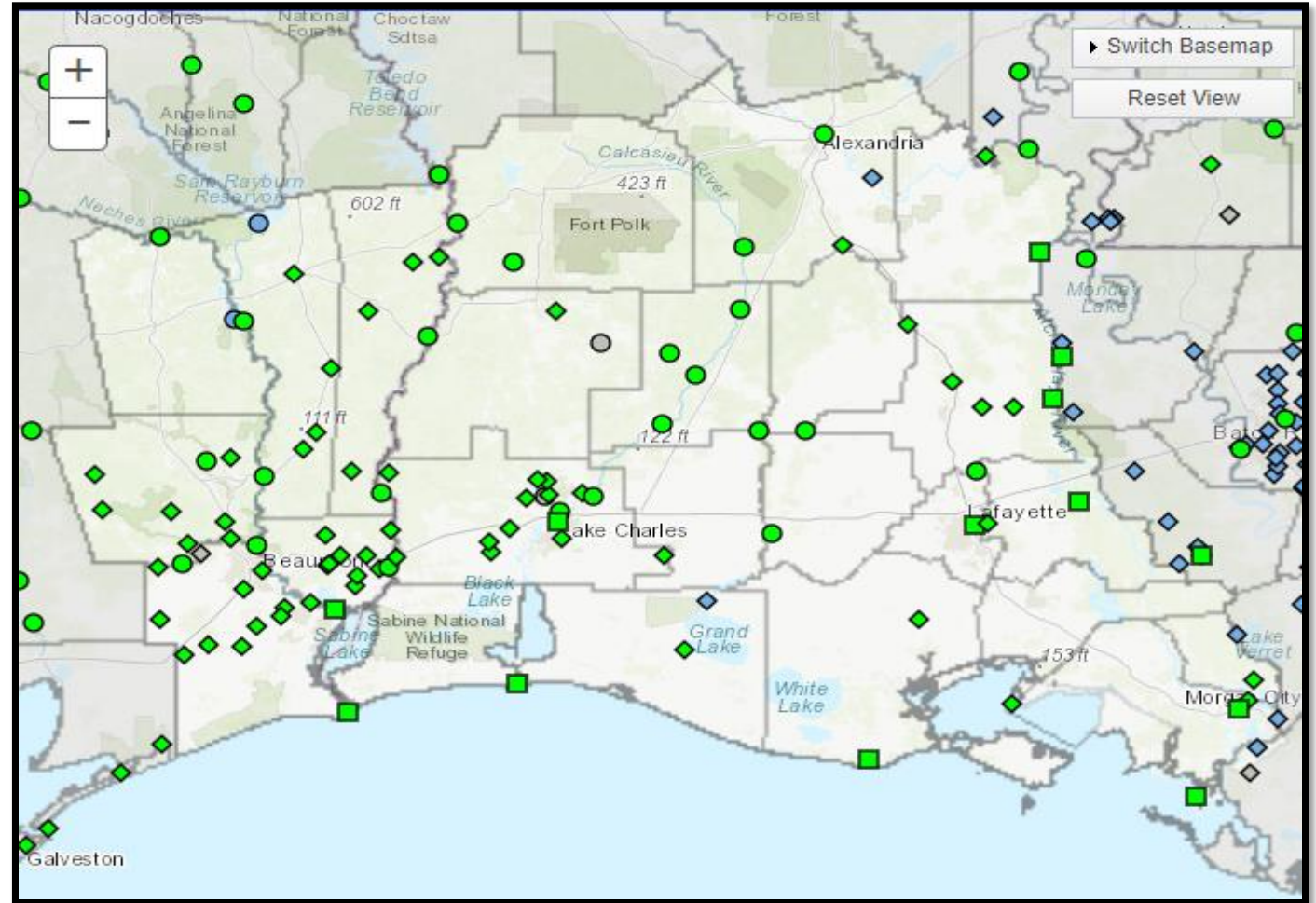

No rivers are in flood or forecast to reach flood stage at this moment.

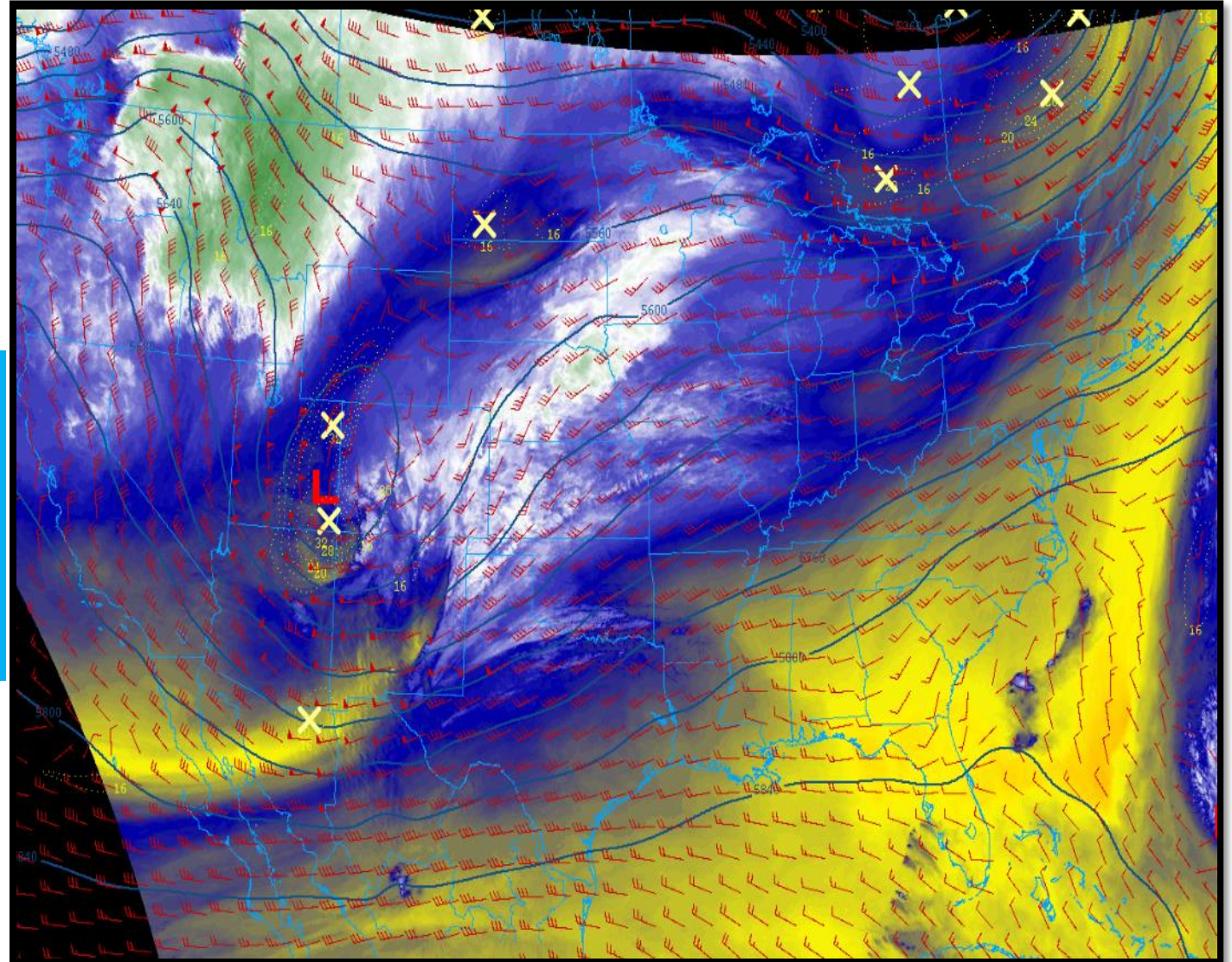


Upper Level Steering Patterns

Low pressure is located near the Four Corners region, while winds aloft are east to northeast across the eastern US.

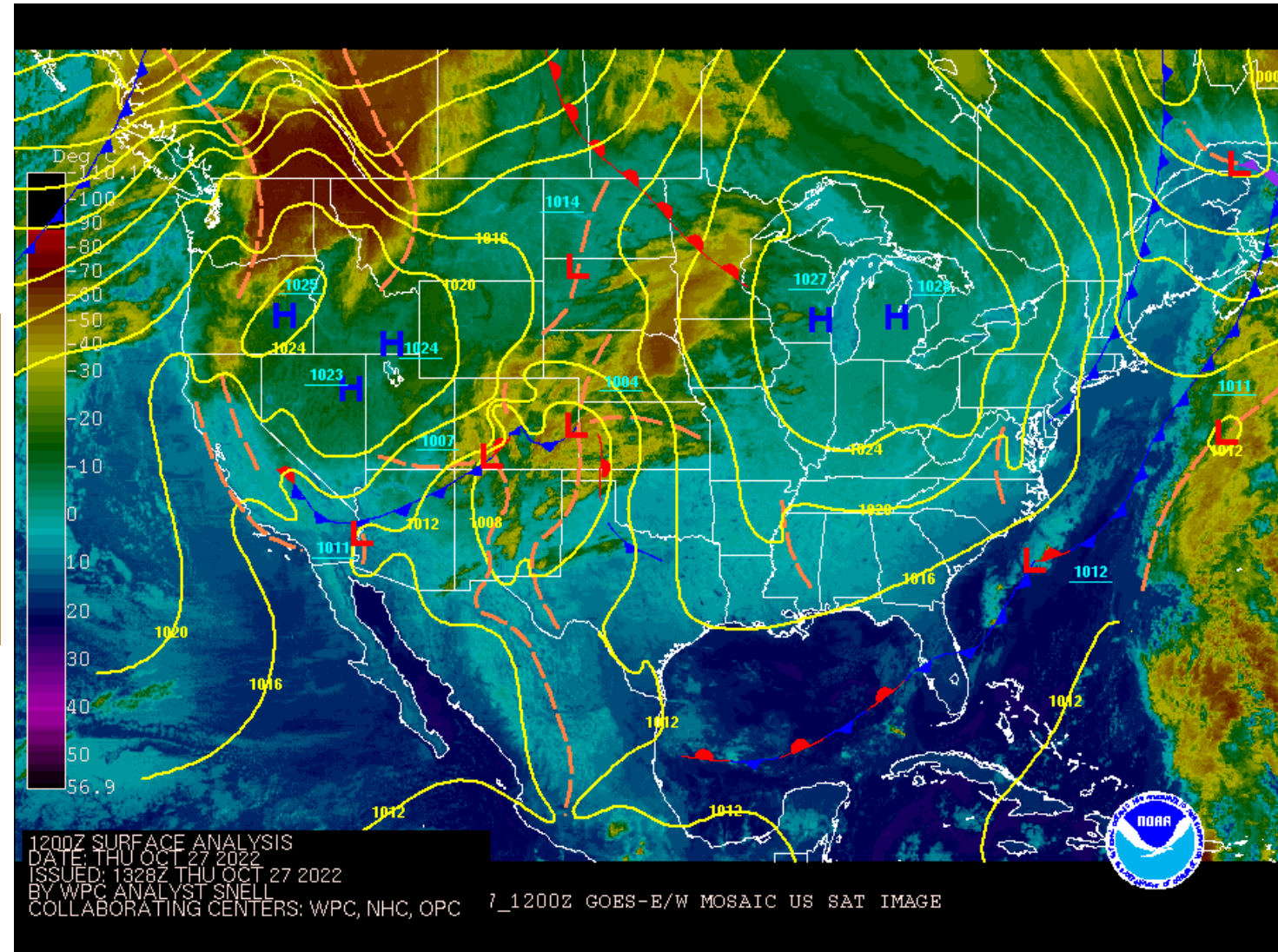


Surface Weather Map with Fronts

High pressure dominates much of the eastern US. An area of low pressure is developing in the lee of the Rockies.

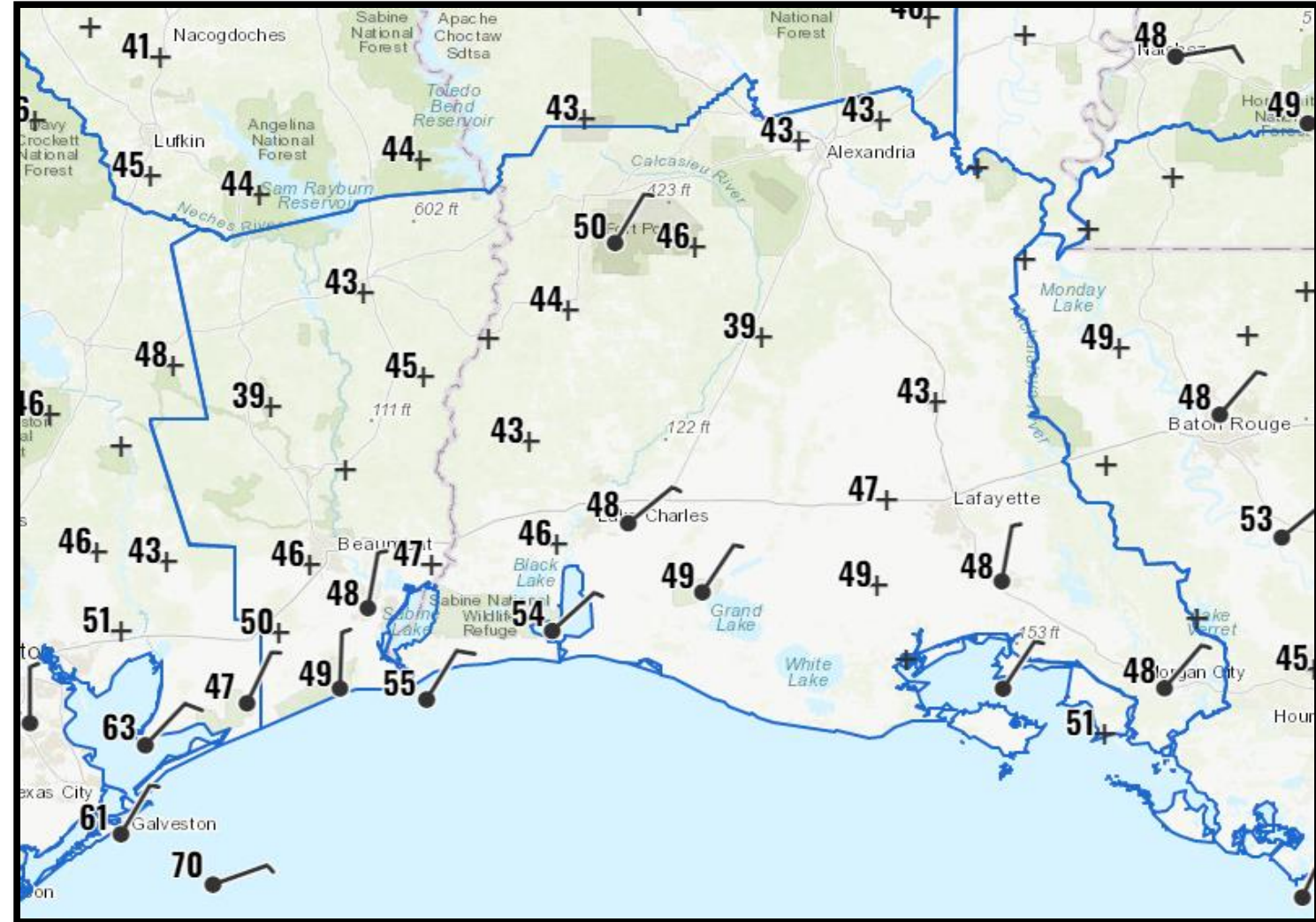


6 am Weather Observations

Clear and cool conditions were noted this morning, with light northeast or near calm winds across the area.

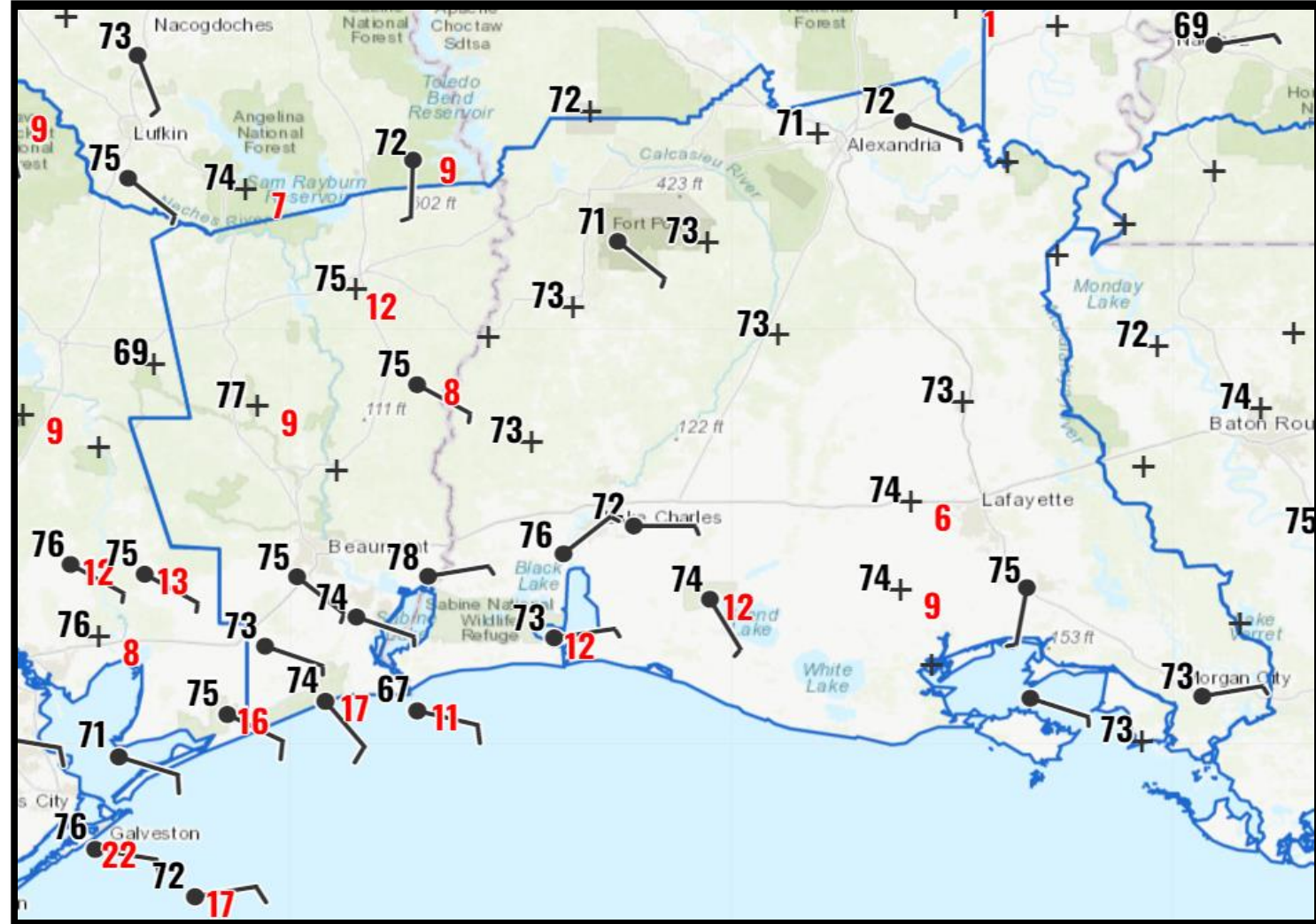


2 pm Weather Observations

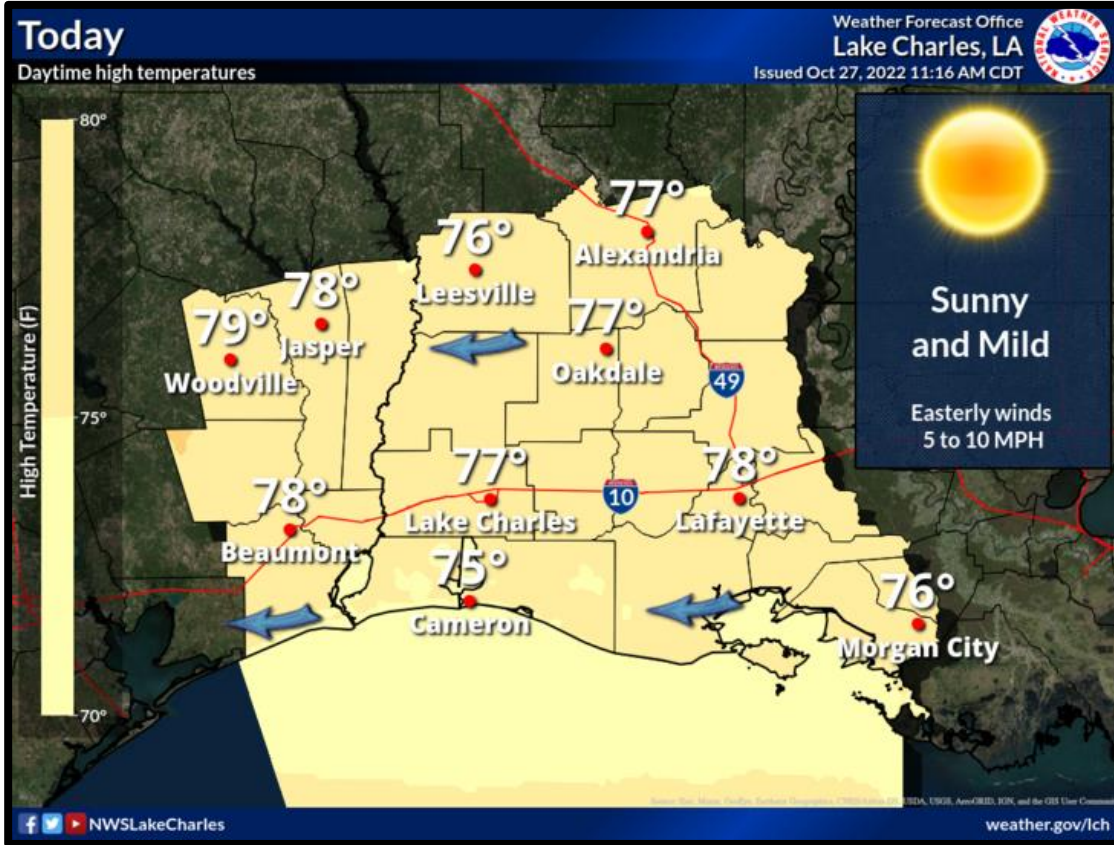
Sunny and warm this afternoon, with winds becoming southeast 5 to 10 mph.

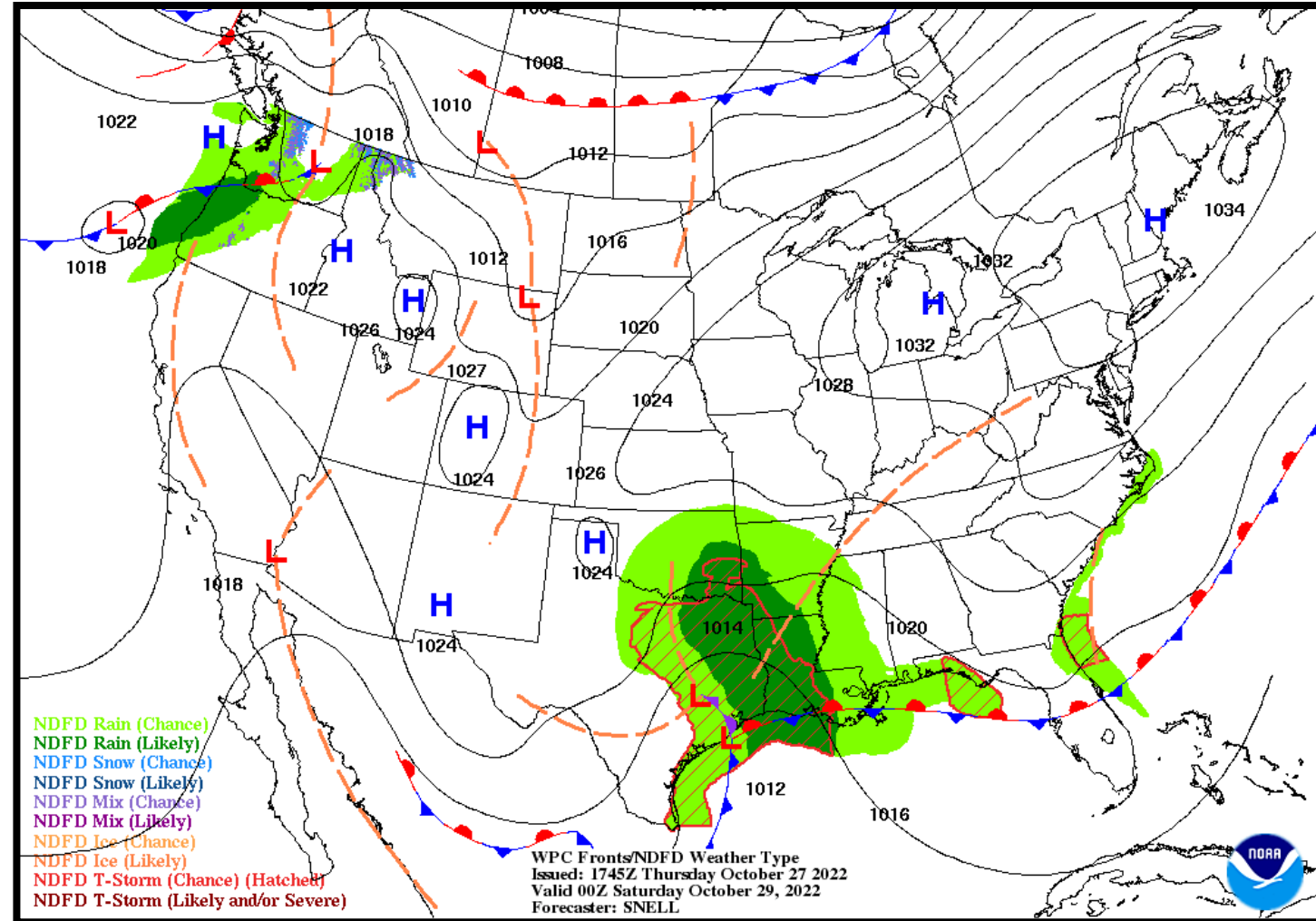

Showers and storms will increase from west to east late tonight into Friday. Some storms could produce heavy rainfall which could lead to short term flooding of roadways and low lying areas.

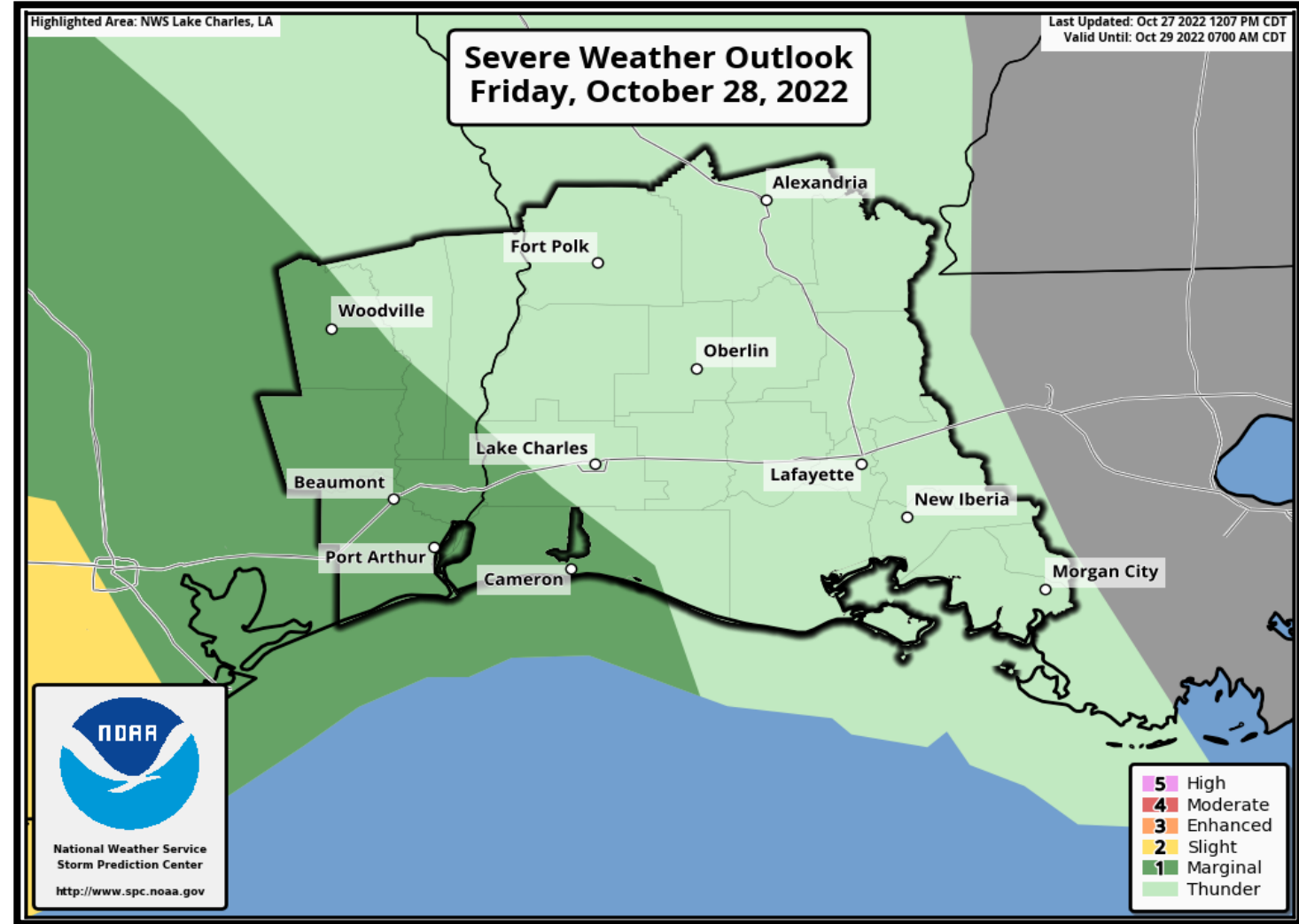


Severe Weather Outlook - Friday

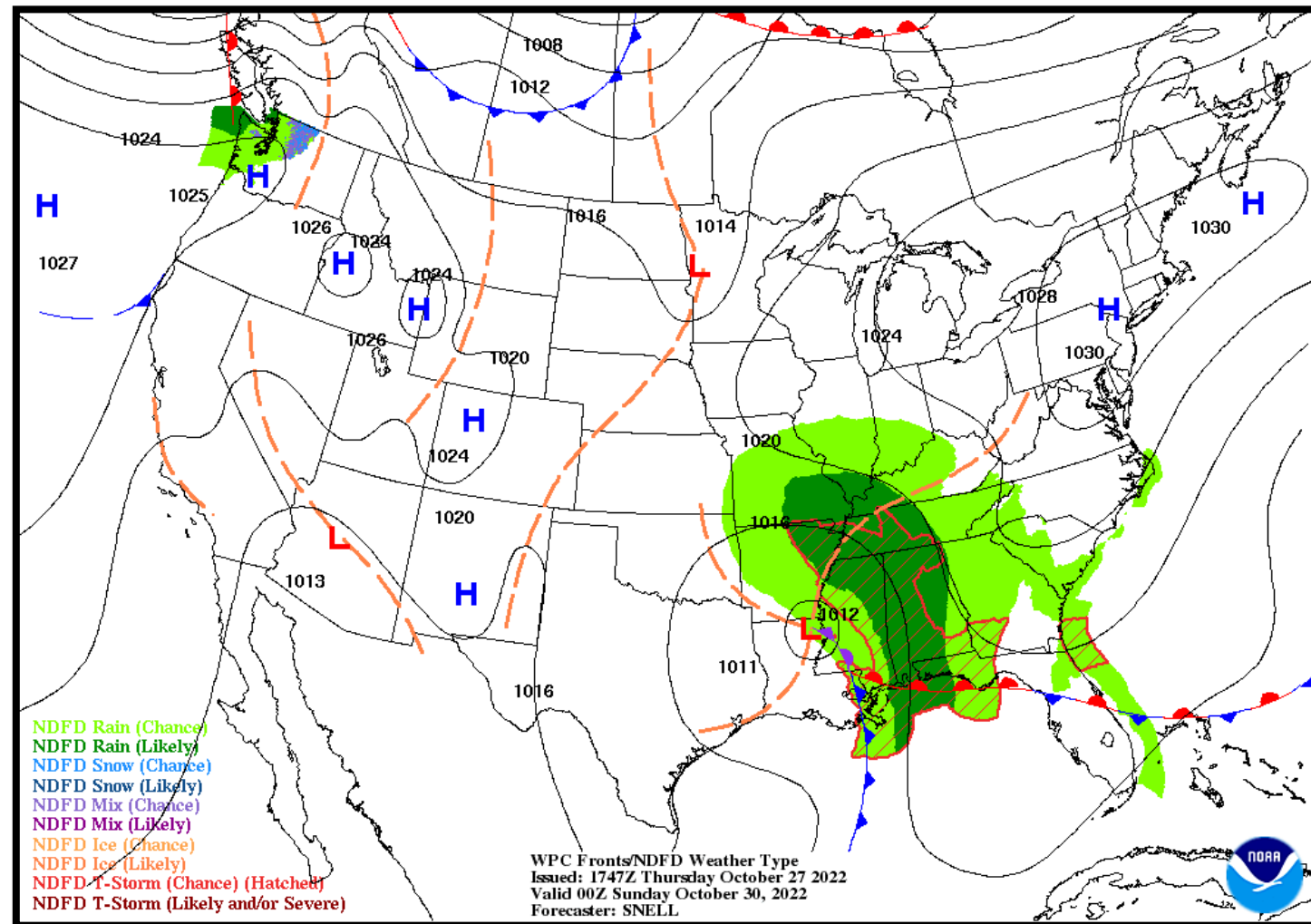
There is a marginal risk for severe weather as well. The primary threats will be for wind and hail, but an isolated tornado or two cannot be ruled out.

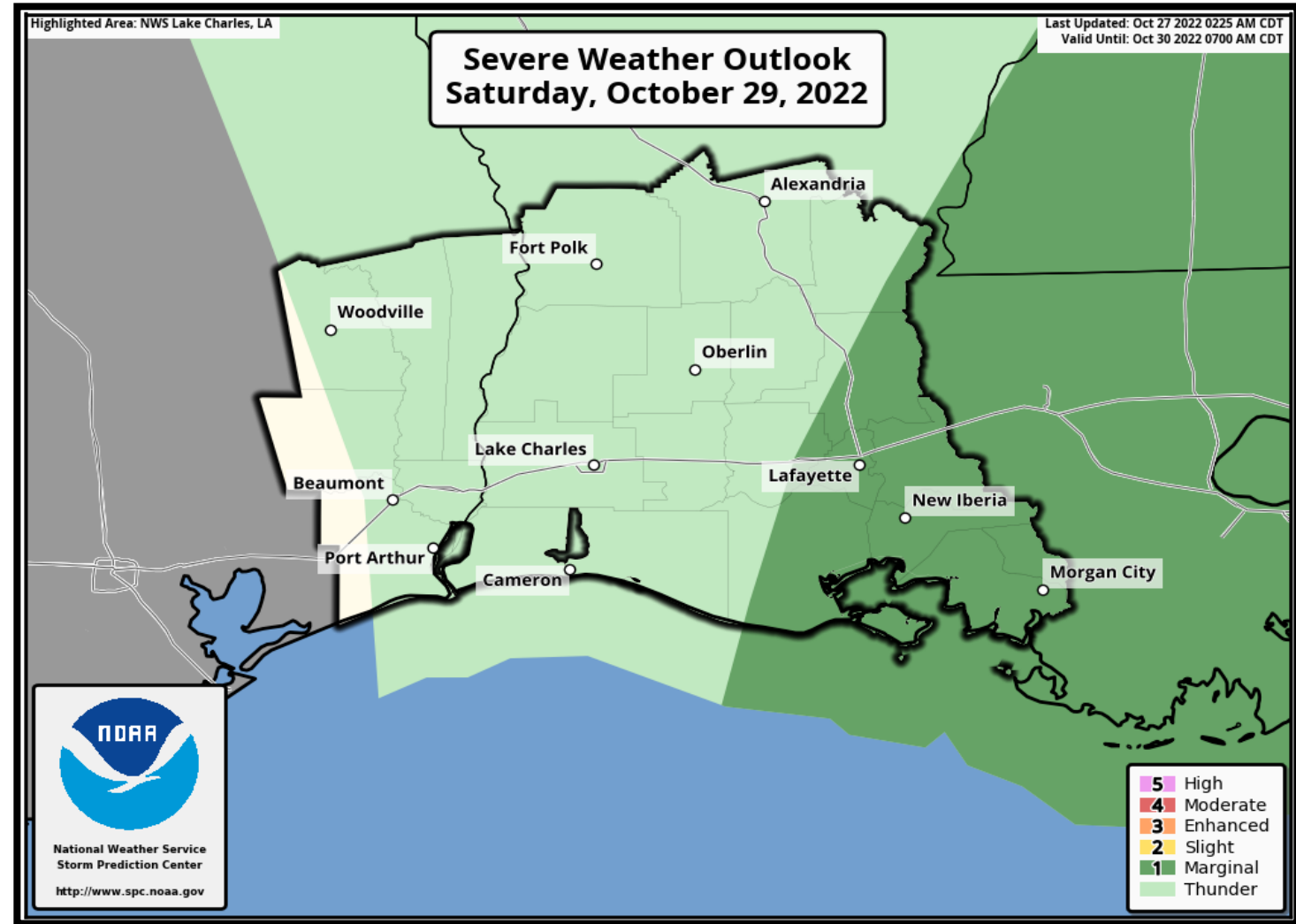


Severe Weather Outlook - Saturday

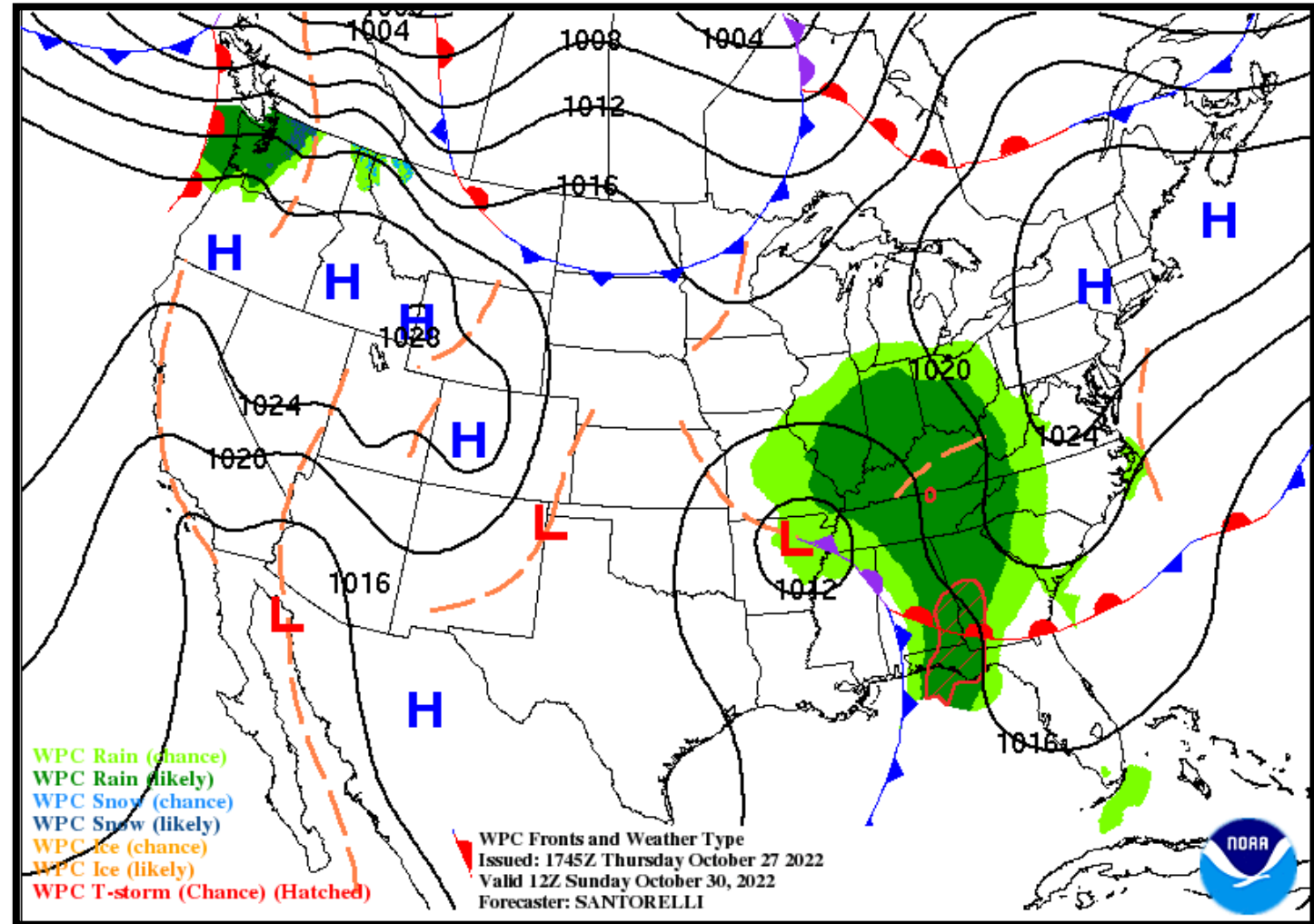
Showers and storms will move east Friday night into Saturday, along with the marginal risk for severe weather. The threat will be greatest early in the day, then decrease through the afternoon.

- Showers and storms becoming numerous Friday into Friday night before decreasing through the day Saturday.
- There is a Marginal Risk for severe weather (wind, hail and possibly an isolated tornado) and excessive rainfall Friday into early Saturday.
- Dry weather returns by Sunday and continues into early next week, with seasonal temperatures expected.
