

### Synopsis

August 2019 was very hot and dry as monsoon moisture struggled to produce more than just spotty thunderstorm coverage over New Mexico. Showers and thunderstorms produced the greatest coverage of rainfall over the eastern plains while central and western New Mexico experienced another month of hit or miss storms. The Four Corners region remained exceptionally dry throughout the month. Temperatures were very hot with statewide average temperatures well above normal. Roswell reached 100°+ on 20 days, of which 6 days were 105°+, with one day at 111° (2<sup>nd</sup> warmest temperature ever recorded at Roswell). Severe weather was limited to only a handful of hail, high wind, and flash flood events.




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
# August 2019 Climate Summary State Precipitation






## **Statewide Temperature & Precipitation Trends**








Precipitation

The average statewide temperature in August was 75.4° which was 4.5° above the normal of 70.9° (1901-2000). This is the 2<sup>nd</sup> warmest August on record for New Mexico.

The average statewide precipitation was 1.64" which was 0.83" below the normal of 2.47" (1901-2000). This ranks as the 23<sup>rd</sup> driest August on record for New Mexico.

#### Albuquerque Sunport Temperatures






The average temperature for Albuquerque was 79.6°, which was 3.4° above the normal of 76.2°. The average maximum temperature for the month was 93.2°. This was 6.0° above the normal average maximum temperature of 87.2°. The average minimum temperature for the month was 66.0°. This was 0.9° above the normal average minimum temperature of 65.1°. This ranks as the 3<sup>rd</sup> warmest August on record.

#### **Clayton Temperatures**






The average temperature for Clayton was 75.6°, which was 2.3° above the normal of 73.3°. The average maximum temperature for the month was 90.7°. This was 4.5° above the normal average maximum temperature of 86.2°. The average minimum temperature for the month was 60.5°. This was 0.2° above the normal average minimum temperature of 60.3°. This ranks as the 12<sup>th</sup> warmest August on record.


#### **Roswell Temperatures**





The average temperature for Roswell was 86.5°, which was 7.8° above the normal of 78.7°. The average maximum temperature for the month was 100.6°. This was 8.9° above the average maximum temperature of 91.7°. The average minimum temperature for the month was 72.3°. This was 6.5° above the normal average minimum temperature of 65.8°. This ranks as the warmest August on record.
