The Texas department of transportation reported that eastbound Interstate 40 frontage road is closed at Helium Road due to flood damage to the roadway. The Soncy Road exit from eastbound Interstate 40 is also closed.

Clearing skies in the southwest Texas Panhandle allowed thunderstorms to rapidly develop across that region. With weak steering winds under 20 MPH, storms slowly drifted to the northeast mainly staying over parts of Deaf Smith, Oldham, Potter, and Randall counties. Some cores did develop severe hail and did exhibit strong rotation. The main with these storms were the back building and training of thunderstorms that resulted in flash flooding and numerous flooding reports across the aforementioned counties that were still occurring into the morning hours on the 8th. In a time frame of 24-48 hours after the event, several reports from the public and media showed numerous areas around the Bushland area still under a foot or two of still/moving water covering roadways and impacting some barns/outbuildings.

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
