

School Bond Vote Planning Raises Familiar Question

A partly-political question years old, and it's about time which has plagued Cedar Rapids school board members for years again stands in the way of plans for a bond issue election.

The question is whether voters will stand still for the tearing down of as many as seven old grade schools throughout the city. The current school board members will visit as many of the old buildings as possible Monday after they eat lunch at the old Fillmore school, which was built in 1895.

"The ideal situation would be to tear them all down," said Waldo Berger, chairman of the board building and grounds committee. He said he referred to Van Buren, Tyler, Taylor, Jackson, Polk, Fillmore and Johnson school.

"This might be the opportune time to do it," Berger said. "These structures are 60 to 80

Appoint Teacher Education Head, Registrar at Coe

Appointments of a chairman of the department of teacher education and of a registrar were announced Friday by Coe college president Joseph E. McCabe.

Appointed an associate professor of education and chairman of the department was Dr. Ben Dukes, who has been on the faculty at Alabama college since 1964.

Coe's new registrar will be Larry Wilkins Jones, a native of Ames who is taking graduate work at the University of Chicago. Jones is married to the former Malinda Newman, whose parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. W. Newman, live at 220 Nineteenth street NE.

Both of the appointments fill vacancies created by the deaths during the last few months of Coe staff members. Registrar Tom Williams died last winter and Prof. Howard Hightower died in March.

Dr. Dukes is a graduate of Southwestern college at Memphis and earned his master's and doctoral degrees at the University of Alabama. Before assuming his present post, he was an instructor in the Mobile public schools and the University of Alabama Military school. He is a member of both the Alabama Education Assn. and the National Education Assn., professional organizations of teachers.

Jones has been a commercial credit investigator and analyst for the Continental Illinois National bank in Chicago. While working toward his master's degree, he also served as a part-time economic research assis-

tant for the Federal Reserve bank of Chicago.

A 1963 graduate of Wesleyan university, Jones earned his master's degree in business administration at the University of Chicago school of business in 1965. He is now working toward the Ph.D. in the department of education at the University of Chicago.

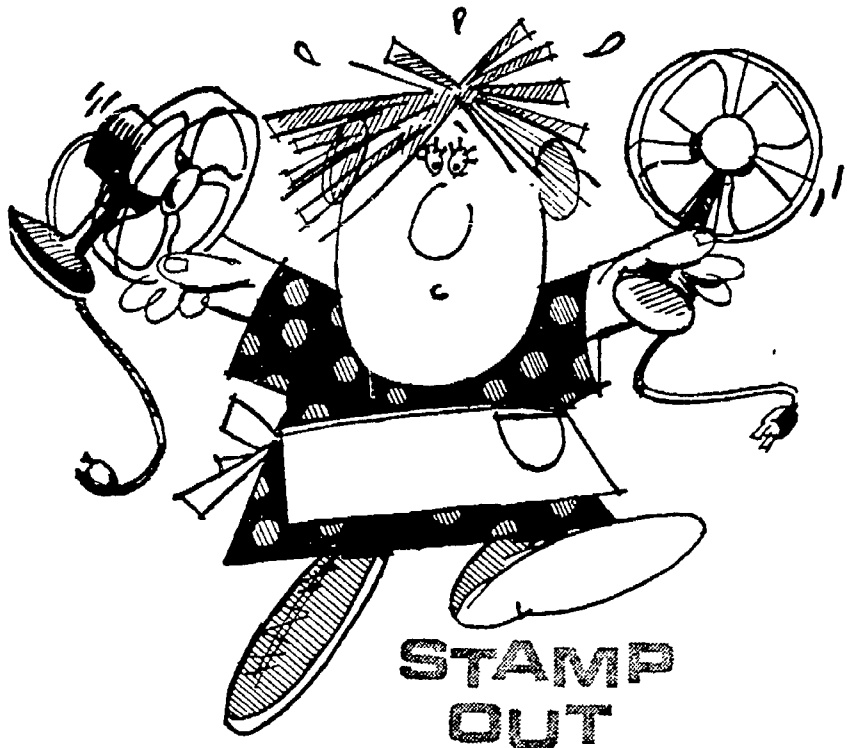
