

Free, Hot Meals Served Workers in Charles City

DES MOINES (UPI) — The tornado struck Charles City just before dinnertime Wednesday, but no one in town who could ask for a free meal has gone hungry.

The state department of public instruction said Friday a center for meals was opened the evening of the tornado with donuts, cookies and coffee available.

By the time Ellis Fischer, commodity supervisor for the school lunch section of the state department of public instruction, arrived in town the next morning, arrangements for a free lunch planned around chili were almost complete.

Fischer said he arrived in Charles City about 8 a.m. Thursday to inform officials of the stricken town that government commodities already stored in a warehouse in the town were available immediately.

He found the warehouse untouched and the local school superintendent already dispensing commodities stored at the school. A meal of chili was scheduled to be served to Charles City public school students Thursday. It went instead to tornado victims and anyone else who asked for it.

Fischer said the chili was prepared by school cooks in the high school, which had electricity and water supplies functioning, then taken to St. John's Lutheran church for distribution. The church is being used as the Red Cross center, he said.

Bowen View on Campus Politics Rapped by Riley

WINTHROP — State Sen. Tom Riley, speaking at East Buchanan high school Friday, rapped University of Iowa President Howard Bowen's view of politics on campus.

Bowen had said earlier and again Thursday in a Des Moines speech that "activist minority of students and a small coterie of faculty" are leading a trend toward campus political action.

He added that some politicians are seeking to make the campus their base of political power and said that he was "not in sympathy with this trend" in referring to New York Gov. Rockefeller's announcing of candidacy for President during an appearance on the U. of Iowa campus recently.

Riley said: "Dr. Bowen's statement shows an amazing lack of confidence in the ability of college students to shape their own political beliefs whether or not they are exposed to appearances on campus by political candidates."

"Academic freedom means the right to express and hear all views — not just those of non-political candidates. It is difficult to understand President Bowen's anxiety over 10,000 students peacefully listening to Gov. Rockefeller in contrast to what appeared to be a lack of concern over the action of 100 students illegally preventing other students entering a university building."

"As a student at the university in 1948, although active in Young Republicans, I regretted the university's refusal to let Presidential Candidate Henry Wallace speak on campus. Although I disagreed with Henry Wallace and his political philosophy I joined 5,000 other students in going to a public park in Iowa City to provide him with an audience as a protest of the university's paternalistic policy. I hope that President Bowen and the university do not revert to that type of policy," Riley said.

"The first thing we were asked when we entered was 'Do you want something to eat?'" he said. Food also was being carried in Red Cross, Salvation Army and Civil Defense trucks to persons working in the areas actually hit by the tornado.

Available to those ladeling out the food were commodities such as butter, cheese, chopped meat, flour, lard, cornmeal raisins, rice, rolled oats and wheat and peanut butter. Though the department's warehouse was without water and electricity for a time frozen foods were stored in nearby Floyd and Colwell and were undamaged.

Fischer said when he left Charles City plans were being made for a hot breakfast for those who wanted it — cooked wheat or oats with raisins in it.

The government commodities are being made available through existing U. S. department of agriculture regulations which make them available for any kind of disaster feeding. Fischer said the Charles City superintendent had the power to dispense the food in his schools and the state department could — and did — authorize the release of all the food in the warehouse.

Financial Aid

The supreme council of the Knights of Columbus in New Haven, Conn., has informed the state secretary of K.C. that they will contribute \$5,000 to the disaster area of Charles City and Oelwein.

Methodist Aid

DES MOINES (UPI) — The United Methodist Church in Iowa will collect a special relief offering for victims of Wednesday's tornadoes in Iowa, it announced Friday.

The call for the offering was issued by Iowa Methodist Bishop James Thomas and by Paul Milhouse of Kansas City, bishop of the Iowa Conference of the United Methodists, formerly the Evangelical United Brethren.

Bishop Thomas said a check for \$5,000 was received from the Belmont Methodist church. A similar offering was collected by the Methodist Church in Iowa after the Belmont tornado of 1966. At that time more than \$50,000 was raised.

The Methodist funds will be used to repair extensive damage to churches and parsonages in Charles City and Oelwein, the church said.

MIAMI (AP) — Sen. McCarthy said Friday he thought Sen. Kennedy's suggestion that he join the Kennedy-for-President campaign "really comes close to an edge of a kind of arrogance."

On the final full day of a swing through Florida, the Minnesota Democrat launched a strong attack on Kennedy and criticized Vice-president Humphrey, another foe in the race for the presidential nomination. "No concessions, no compromise, no accommodations," he said. McCarthy said he is far from discouraged by recent primary setbacks in Indiana and Nebraska.

Hoover Sees Carmichael, Brown Roles in Violence

WASHINGTON (UPI) — FBI Rep. John Rooney (D-N.Y.), Director J. Edgar Hoover said chairman of the appropriations in congressional testimony made subcommittee, asked Hoover: public Saturday that some tense "Were the riots of 1967 racial situations last summer characterized by any particular escalation into violence after pattern or cause?"

Hoover made the statement while testifying Feb. 23 at a closed session of a house appropriations subcommittee on the FBI's \$207 million budget request for fiscal 1969.

Asked about the 1967 summer riots in cities and towns across the nation, Hoover spoke of a "new development, in that tense situations have been further aggravated, with the crowd taking violent action following the exhortations of extremists such as black power advocates Stokely Carmichael and Rap Brown."

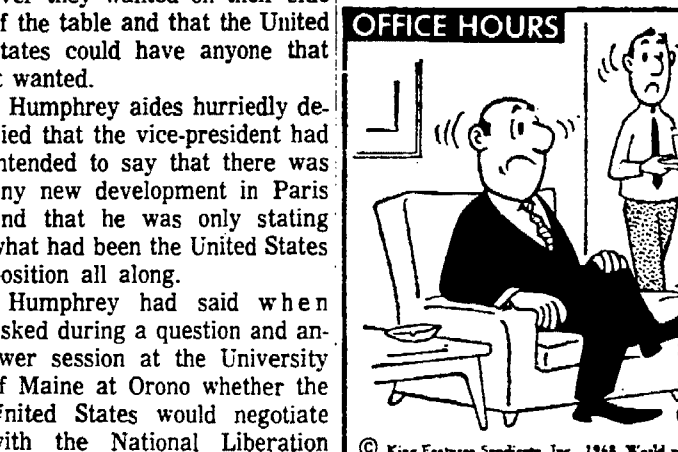
Hoover said evidence showed a growing involvement of criminal elements in racial disorders.

The FBI's fingerprint division found that 65 percent of the fingerprints checked during arrests in the Newark riots and 44 percent in the Detroit riots showed the individuals had criminal records, he said. Hoover said the FBI views the current chairman, already with great concern reports of faces both federal and state charges in connection with his activities.

The reports, he said, "are replete with allegations that these individuals have obtained firearms and are encouraging residents of ghetto areas to obtain weapons."

Hoover also testified: "The FBI has penetrated high levels of the American communist party, subversive organizations, white racist groups, black nationalist organizations and intelligence operations being conducted in this country by representatives of Cuba, Red China and other communist countries."

Clandestine plans were made last June for a "people's revolution" in Mexico but the communist party of Mexico
