Overrule Objections to Marion Paving Project

Marion's council overruled objections to the 1968 No. 1 paving project Monday night. A resolution of necessity was approved, along with plans, specifications and form of contract for the paving.
A hearing on the plans and specifications was set for June 10. Bids will be accepted the same night.

Objections
A written objection from residents on Third avenue between Fourth and Sixth streets was received and filed. The objectors cited high cost, the fact that many of the residents live on fixed incomes and the project was not necessary, as reasons for their objections to the paving.
Councilman Bill Grundy recommended that the city pick up all paving costs over the 27 feet wide and six inch reinforced concrete in residential areas. Grundy included extra width and thickness and intersections in his motion. Commercial areas, property owners would pay for 30 feet wide and seven inches of reinforced concrete. The council approved Grundy's motion.

The council received and filed a traffic survey taken by the Marion Jaycees. City Manager Peter F. Crivaro was directed to set up the necessary procedure to ask the state for a railroad warning signal at the intersection of Eleventh street, Sixth avenue and the Milwaukee tracks. Crivaro will contact the Iowa commerce commission asking for a hearing on the requested signal.

Crivaro said, if funds are available and the commission approves the project, the state would pay 80 percent and the city and railroad would each pay 10 percent.
Roger Hildebrandt, Jaycees project chairman, said cars, trucks and people averaged 327 per hour during the two-day survey. Jaycees conducted the survey on Thursday and Friday, March 28 and 29.

Rezoning
By a vote of 5-1, final approval was given to an ordinance vacating the west 117 feet of the east-west alley between Twenty-second and Twenty-third streets and Third and Fourth avenues. Councilman Raymond Eckhart opposed vacating only a portion of the alley.

Action Against Otepka Upheld

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Civil Service Commission has upheld the state department's disciplinary action against Otto Otepka, former chief security evaluator for the department, a partner of Otepka's lawyer said Tuesday.
Otepka was fired in November, 1963, on the grounds he gave classified documents, without authorization, to a senate subcommittee investigating state department procedures.

He appealed within the department and last Dec. 11, Secretary Rusk rescinded the dismissal and ordered him demoted, re-assigned and reprimanded.
Otepka appealed that decision.

"We Treat Everybody the Same": Warden Bennett

DES MOINES (AP) — Warden John E. Bennett of the Fort Madison state penitentiary said Tuesday he does not know of any racial discrimination at the prison and "as far as I'm concerned, I think we treat everybody the same."
An official of the Iowa civil rights commission said Monday that Negro penitentiary inmates have complained of discrimination, particularly in matters of discipline and parole.

Bennett said he planned no investigation into information reported by David L. Mullin, acting executive director of the rights commission. "He doesn't give us any names or anything like that. Up to now, it's nothing serious that I know of," Bennett said.

Addressing a meeting of the West Central Wardens Assn. in Des Moines Monday night, Mullin said prisoner complaints which involve possible violations of Iowa Civil Rights law will be resolved. The law prohibits identifying persons involved in cases under investigation by the commission, he said.

Reporting on recent interviews at Fort Madison, Mullin told wardens that Negro inmates feel they often serve a longer sentence than white prisoners for the same offense, and that they "will automatically be blamed" for fights with white prisoners, thus blotting their disciplinary records and weakening their chances for parole.

Other complaints, according to Mullin, include claims that Negroes are given "dirty and undesirable" jobs, are subjected in some cases to racial slurs, and have repeatedly asked for

more Negro staff members at the penitentiary.
Bennett said there are two Negroes on the Fort Madison correctional force, one of them a lieutenant.
An official of the state bureau of adult correction services said Tuesday there are openings on the 188-man force but as far as he knows no Negroes have applied for the jobs.
"We would certainly encourage qualified Negroes who are interested in correctional officer positions to apply," said Glen Jeffes, the bureau's personnel administrator.

Students Harass Ireland Leader

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (AP) — A jeering crowd of demonstrators hurled eggs, stones and bags of flour at Prime Minister Terence O'Neill during an appearance Monday night.

O'Neill was unhurt. He had been speaking before a Conservative party meeting in a strongly Protestant district of the Northern Ireland capital.

Carrying placards saying "O'Neill Must Go," the demonstrators surrounded the prime minister's car and battled with police protecting him.

Anti-Catholics have denounced O'Neill for his efforts to reconcile differences with Dublin by exchanging visits with the republic's prime minister, Jack Lynch.
