Lutherans To Dedicate New Addition To Home For Aged

STRAWBERRY POINT (Special) — The Strawberry Point Lutheran Home for the Aged will hold the dedication of its new addition Sunday afternoon, June 2, at 2 p. m. at the Emanuel Lutheran church, Strawberry Point. Open house will be held following this service from 3 to 5 at the Home.

Administrators are Mr. and Mrs. Adolph Schuchmann, and along with a jurisdictional unit of a nine-member board, the Home is supported by 16 neighboring congregations. The Rev. Vernon Fasse, St. John's Lutheran church, Arlington, is the part-time chaplain.

The beginning of the Strawberry Point Lutheran Home came on Sept. 11, 1940, when several Lutheran congregations sent representatives to a meeting for the purpose of aged people to start a Home for the Aged. The deed of a 13-room house was gratefully accepted from John Pebler, a member of Emanuel Lutheran church, Strawberry Point. Articles of incorporation were drawn up and soon the Home was in operation.

Mrs. Maxwell To Retire

A "survival kit for managing the 25 hour day" proved a timely subject for Oelwein Rotarians at their weekly meeting at Hotel Mealey where they heard Mrs. LeGrand (Margaret) Maxwell, Fayette, discuss the advantages of rapid reading.

Explaining that material starts stacking up for most people, unable to cope with all of their magazines and newspapers, the rapid reading procedure which has meant up to 10,000 words a minute for a selected few, means more trade magazines and fiction can be read, many hours per week gained and one's vocabulary sharply improved.

Mrs. Maxwell, who with her husband will be giving nine different lectures in the west next month, explained that normally slow reading is usually due to the oral reading done in the early grades; so most people plod along at 250 words a minute. It has been claimed that former president John F. Kennedy was able to read 2500 words per minute and the average college student's speed is 425.

Both of the Maxwells are on the music faculty of Upper Iowa College in administrative positions.

Maxwell introduced Bonnie Storr, Waterloo, a junior music student at UIC, who played a difficult solo on her E flat alto saxophone as LeGrand Maxwell accompanied on the piano.

E.D. Mallam, club president, reported from the governor of Rotary district 597 that all clubs had been urged to send funds to Oelwein and Charles City tornado disaster committees, dividing them equally, and that to date Rotary clubs from several cities nearby have responded: Maquoketa \$50, West Union \$100, Oelwein \$500.

It was announced that the Chicago Great Western had contributed \$2500.

of the frame house. On May 6, 1963, the frame house was dismantled and the front of the south building was added.

The former lounge and dining area in this building is now a complete dining room with the Home serving 42 residents meals at tables seated six in a group. This room is also used for church services.

The kitchen adjoining has been enlarged adding what was the laundry room. New equipment includes a refrigerator, mixer, stove, serving cart, and dish warmer.

Connecting this building to the new wing is a comfortable lounge and recreation room. This room is decorated in avocado greens and browns and furnished with

inple furniture. Having the capacity of 38 beds, 16 double and six single, the new wing has all except two filled. Twenty-five in the new addition were occupied in 10 days. And there is still a waiting list. The total capacity is 74.

Other rooms making up the 8,736 square feet of this addition are two smaller lounges, a nurses station, a utility room, an office, a medical supply room, a public rest room, baths, linen closet. The supply room is now equipped with a suction pump, emergency oxygen, and an autoclave (sterilizer).

An intercom system can be heard in the laundry, kitchen, nurses station, office, and hall. The Home is of fire resistant construction and as fireproof as possible, having an automatic fire alarm system.

The laundry room in the basement employs one full time and two part time women and they wash five dozen sheets daily.

The Home staff includes three registered nurses and one licensed practical nurse who are also on night call, nurses aides, kitchen helper, cleaning person, and a secretary.

Mrs. Schuchmann remarked for many years she would like to have a flag pole and flag. This was made possible when Donald Baumgartner presented the Home with the flag pole; the Iowa and American flags were donated by the American Legion, and Earl Swales who presented the foundation.
