An intense low pressure system over southern Saskatchewan Canada trailed a strong cold front into eastern Montana on the 31st of October. The strong cold front entered western North Dakota Sunday evening on the 31st moving into central North Dakota before midnight then across east central North Dakota during the early morning hours of November 1st. The system brought widespread winds in excess of 65 mph to the region. The high winds combined with very dry conditions caused numerous wild fires burning thousands of acres of land and a few buildings. Numerous homes and businesses reported wind damage to roofs and windows.
