

the field of meteorological observations. The award is named for a Lutheran minister who is the first person known to have taken systematic weather observations in the American colonies. The Reverend John Campanius made records of the climate without the use of instruments in 1644 and 1645 near the present site of Wilmington, DE. These observations were published in Sweden by his grandson Thomas Campanius Holm in 1702.

Dear Cooperative Observers:

This is the first issue of a National Cooperative Observer Newsletter. Due to budgetary restrictions the Office of Management and Budget eliminated the Regional Cooperative Observer Newsletters and suggested the publication of a National Cooperative Observer Newsletter. The responsibility for coordinating the actions needed to publish this newsletter will be the National Cooperative Program Management.

JEFFERSON AND HOLM AWARDS 1982

The National Weather Service has nearly 11,600 volunteer observers who make and record daily weather observations in all parts of the United States. The valuable information they gather becomes a valuable part of the Nation's weather.

For their dedication and contribution to the Nation, 31 observers have been honored this year. Six received the Thomas Jefferson Award which originated in 1959 to honor volunteer weather observers for unusual and outstanding achievements. It is the highest award the National Weather Service presents to volunteer observers. The award is named for Jefferson because the statesman-scientist made an almost unbroken series of weather observations from 1776 to 1816.

Twenty-five observers received the John Campanius Holm Award created in 1953 and made annually to honor volunteer observers for outstanding accomplishments in



GETTING READY FOR WINTER

Non Recording Rain Gage:


During the beginning of the snowfall season only the 8-inch rain gage can is exposed to catch the snow. The funnel and measuring tube are removed at the beginning of the snowfall season. The measuring tube is used to measure the water from the melted snow.



If you are listening to a weather report on the radio or TV and they indicate that a sudden freeze will be approaching your area, record the amount of water in the measuring tube and empty it. This will prevent the measuring tube from freezing and popping at the seams.

Recording Rain Gage:

Please remove the funnel at the beginning of the snowfall season. The funnel on a Fischer & Porter gage is similar in appearance and position although the funnel is more cone shape.



Add antifreeze before snow or freezing temperatures are likely to occur. In more Southern states antifreeze may not be needed due to mild winters.

Instructions for use of antifreeze should be reviewed. Instructions appear in Handbook No. 2, page 24. Instructions are also on the labels of the cans of antifreeze furnished each recording rain gage station.

Antifreeze solution in the rain gages should be stirred occasionally, especially after rain or snow to help maintain a uniform mixture.

Reports have been received that the ethylene glycol antifreeze froze up because it had not been stirred to mix with the water from the rain or snow.



We hope to have Mr. Nielsen continue serving the Weather Service; this time as a flash flood observer.




