


March 28, 1984...Severe Thunderstorms and Tornadoes Ravage South Carolina

These pictures, courtesy of "The State", Columbia Newspapers, Inc, SC, show some of the damage from severe thunderstorms and tornadoes in the Newberry, SC and Bennettsville, SC areas.

A tornado struck the business district of Newberry around 5:15 PM then moved eastward, dipping down across open country, then into a populated area just north of the town of Winnsboro, SC. From Winnsboro, the storm moved northeastward toward Bennettsville, slamming into the town demolishing homes and shopping centers. The storm had moved nearly 100 miles by this time. Severe thunderstorms and tornadoes from this same line also moved into the State of North Carolina, causing death and destruction.

A total of seventeen perished in South Carolina from these storms and hundreds injured. It is felt that early warning and precautions taken by individuals to protect themselves, contributed to the prevention of even greater loss of life.







The weather equipment is located at the Irving Power Plant, where a number of employees participate in the collection of weather data.



Majorie Joy, Blue, AZ, received a 25-year length-of-service award from Irv Haynes, CPM, Phoenix, AZ.


Mrs. Joy, the former owner and operator of Joy's Lodge, has been an observer since 1959 when the station was established.




Continental Divide: It takes a westerly path across the Brooks Range in northern Alaska.

Another article by Neil Davis of the Geophysical Institute, University of Alaska, to enlighten our observers.

"The Continental Divide trends roughly north-south through the United States along the backbone of the Rocky Mountains. It divides the country into watersheds emptying westward into the Pacific Ocean or eastward into the Atlantic Ocean of the Gulf of Mexico.

One would think that extension of the Continental Divide into Alaska would bring it along the lofty Alaska Range and across Mt. McKinley. Instead, as the map shows, the Continental Divide through Alaska runs along the Brooks Range and into the Seward Peninsula where it terminates at Cape Prince of Wales. Thus it separates the watersheds draining north and west into the Arctic Ocean from those draining west and south into the Bering Sea.

The curious track of the Continental Divide from the Rockies into the Brooks Range led geologists until recently to assume erroneously that the Brooks Range was a structural extension of the Rocky Mountains. But just within recent years geologists have determined that the Brooks Range was uplifted about 100-200 million years ago, sometime earlier than the uplift of the Rockies, 65 million years ago. So now, most geologists think that the Brooks Range is not structurally related to the Rocky Mountains. Nor is the Alaska Range. It has been formed very recently, within the last five million years, and is still rising."



A new climate station was opened at Port Protection in southeast Alaska, the main observer will be Shirley Piedra shown below with her daughter. A site survey for a new climate station was completed at the Point Mackenzie Dairy Project, at the James Farm. The new observer will be Karen Lackey. The point Mackenzie Project is located northwest of Anchorage across Knik Arm. Arrangements are being concluded to install a climate station at Fort Yukon in conjunction with the aviation station at that location.

The second Maximum/Minimum Temperature System (MMTS) was installed at Hope, Alaska the last week in June. We have received more pipes and fittings for the units and should see an increase in the amount of MMTS installed in the next few months.
