






Coop and Contract Station at Port Alsworth, AK. The station is located on the east shore of Lake Clark, about 160 miles southwest of Anchorage.



George Cebula at newly installed staff gage on the Kenai River at Kenai Keys, AK.




Looking east from the staff gage at Kenai Keys, AK. Kenai Keys is just outside of Sterling, about 100 miles south of Anchorage.



Looking northeast from the station at Port Alsworth, AK. The station has been operated by the Alsworth family since June 1960.








The Thomas Jefferson Award was started in 1959 to honor five observers out of over 11,000 nation-wide for unusual and outstanding achievements in meteorological observations.




CLEMON CLEWELL, official cooperative weather observer at Watonga, has been awarded the US government's 40-YEAR EMBLEM.

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

James has an avid interest in the weather. He has taken thousands of school children on tours of the agriculture weather station and answered hundreds of questions from locals about the climate records over the 26 plus years he has been an observer. Significant data were recorded by James at two locations for over 15 years. Owing to the different soil types and elevation differences these two stations, which were about 1500 feet from each other, had significantly different climate records.



JOHN MUSHRUSH, OBSERVER, HOOPESTON, IL, for OVER 41 YEARS, was presented the THOMAS JEFFERSON AWARD at the Hoopeston American Legion.

John, who is 68, has been a volunteer observer for the National Weather Service since May 1951. He reads the instruments daily, and records high and low temperatures and rainfall amounts. John has acquired the weather records for Hoopeston dating back to 1902 and has made graphs in ten-year segments depicting the average temperature and precipitation. He uses his graphs for presentations at schools and organizations throughout east-central Illinois, and to keep a continuous picture of the climate in the Hoopeston area.

Attending the award ceremony were several local area dignitaries and political figures; led by Representative William Black, who started the proceedings by reading a letter of congratulations from President Bush for John's outstanding accomplishments. This was followed by an entourage of National Weather Service Representatives, lauding the praises of John Mushrush and his perfect record of continuous, accurate, and timely weather observations over the past 41 years. These guests were Bill Buckingham, CPM, IL; Roger Kenyon, CPM, IN; Al Shipe, Hydrologist, IN; John Curran, MIC/AM, IN; and presenting John with the actual award, Paul Daily, MIC/AM, IL.

Several other dignitaries were present for John's award presentation. One of which was Dr. Wayne Wendland, State Climatologist for IL, with the Illinois Water Survey, located on the campus of the University of Illinois in Champaign-Urbana.

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The National Weather Service honored MAPLETON, IA, OBSERVER MAY SCHEER by presenting her the THOMAS JEFFERSON AWARD FOR OUTSTANDING ACHIEVEMENT. The ceremony was held at the Community Center.

Iowa Area Manager J. John Feldt and Iowa Cooperative Program Manger William R. Newman-presented the agency's most prestigious volunteer award to Mrs. Scheer. Newman noted that, "Weather observing has been a significant interest in her life and she is top of the line."

Mrs. Scheer, 82, became the official observer for the Mapleton station in 1945, inheriting the family job started by her father, who established the station in 1936. Mr. Newman noted, "Her enthusiasm and willingness remain impressive. She is very enthusiastic and cooperative. She has displayed unusual accuracy, neatness, completeness, and promptness in her records for MORE THAN 48 YEARS."

Equipped with only a thermometer and a rain gage, the standard tools of the volunteer weather observer's trade, Mrs. Scheer is none-the-less looked to as the weather expert in Mapleton. She receives frequent calls asking how low or high temperatures were or how much precipitation fell. Noting, in a 1988 article, that "When you're out in the country, you watch for the signs, circles around the sun and moon, halos..."to indicate what weather is coming. Scheer is quick to note that, "I can just tell you what we've had, not what we're going to have."

A third-generation volunteer observer at Mapleton (her brother took observations for a time at the site established by their father), Scheer shares her weather enjoyment and sense of responsibility with her entire family. Her sister, Dorothy Pope, is the observer at the second Mapleton observation site.

Stepping up to receipt of the Jefferson Award seems a natural progression for someone as meticulous and humble as Mrs. Scheer, but her awards are definitely earned. "We don't just give awards out automatically," Central Region Cooperative Program Manager Tom Sinclair said from his Kansas City, MO, office. "The Weather Service only gives out five Jefferson Awards each year, so we're pretty particular about who receives them. Mrs. Scheer just has an outstanding record of observations and goes the extra mile in making sure everything is accurate and timely."

Slogging through mud puddles right after torrential rains and through snow drifts on the heels of blizzards hasn't been any more exciting or any easier for Mrs. Scheer than it would be for anyone else. There is a simple reason she has continued her dedication through her 48 years of service, a reason that emphasizes Mrs. Scheer's worthiness for the Jefferson Award. "We look on it as an opportunity to serve," she said.

BLOCKTON, IOWA - The National Weather Service honored Blockton volunteer Weather OBSERVER DEAN A. COBB with the JOHN CAMPANIUS HOLM AWARD, the agency's second highest award for volunteer observers, at a ceremony at the Legion Auxiliary Hall.

Iowa Area Manager J. John Feldt and Iowa CPM, William R. Newman presented the award to Mr. Cobb for, "outstanding accomplishments in the field of cooperative observations." The award is named for the Lutheran minister who was the first person known to take systematic weather observations in the American Colonies, beginning in 1644. The award is granted to a maximum 25 volunteer observers each year.

Mr. Cobb, 73, began his tenure as a volunteer Weather Service observer on September 9, 1958, taking over the site two miles south of Blockton that had been established by his father in 1941. He has maintained an exemplary record over the years, according to Thomas P. Sinclair, CPM for the 14-station Central Region headquartered in Kansas City, MO.

An active farmer who received a 35-year service award this year, Mr. Cobb has certainly met the reporting aspect of eligibility requirements. "Observations are accurate, neat, complete, and prompt," Newman

said. "His attitude is great and the records perfect. He has given weather information to the public cheerfully and has offered to expand his services."

Mr. Cobb said he comes by his interest in weather naturally, and that it began at an early age. "Since I walked to country school a mile across the fields over hill and dale and across creeks," he said. "I needed to know how to dress appropriately for the kind of day it was, especially in the cold blustery days of winter."

Some of the more memorable weather events he cited from those years of interest include the election day snow storm when Franklin D. Roosevelt became president; the 1936 winter that set a record for continuous day below zero followed by a summer with a record number of days above 100°; the 9 inch-rainfall of August 1937; and the April 1973 blizzard that destroyed many cattle.


"As I have always been on the farm, I have always been a great observer of the weather," Cobb said, "probably because of my father's interest in it. Farmers are usually more interested in weather than many other classes of peoples as the success of their labor is greatly dependent upon the kind of weather that occurs."





According to Nebraska's Cooperative Program Manager Terry Landsvork, the data provided by cooperative observers is used extensively by the National Weather Service, State Climatologist, and others in the public and private sectors. It eventually becomes a permanent part of the climatic record for the local area and nation.

Using equipment furnished by the National Weather Service, Mr. Romsdale is able to take a variety of weather measurements, transmitting his readings to a special weather computer in Omaha.

Mr. Romsdale said he and his wife Patricia Anne have assisted each other over the years, making sure they record necessary readings.

Although Mr. Romsdale said that taking the readings has become part of the "usual daily routine," there have been some "non-typical days" as a volunteer including when a windstorm blew through Bradshaw last July 8.

"The power was down and I knew I had to get my readings reported to the National Weather Service so I radioed them in from a transmitter in my pickup," Mr. Romsdale said. "Things were a little different that day."





Vernon Roller, National Weather Service, Bismarck, installed the weather station monitoring equipment in Miller's yard. A computer records high and low daily temperatures and daily precipitation. A "manual" rain gage records precipitation for visual observation.

"The have another instrument that measures wind speed and direction," Miller said. "I'd like to get that too." Roller is checking to see if that equipment can be added to the Mott station.

Reports are sent regularly to national stations in Des Moines, IA. Monthly written reports are mailed to Bismarck.





A Social Call

Creede and stayed on her ranch for over 70 years. She continued to visit with guests of the ranch until her death.

The WRIGHT RANCH IN MINERAL COUNTY, 18 MILES SOUTHWEST OF CREEDE, CO, remains one of the foremost symbols of the pioneering spirit in this area. But the ranch lost a bit of that spirit this summer when MABEL WRIGHT, one of the original settlers there, DIED AT THE AGE OF 94.

She lived on the family ranch for over 70 years and grew to embody the pioneering soul of the ranch. She continued working on the ranch until a year before her death and was influential in the survival of the family-run operations there.

Mrs. Wright was born November 1, 1898, in Lake City. She was one of eight Steele children. Her parents, Charles Steele and Cynthia Weed Steele, were pioneers in Hinsdale County. Besides her work on the ranch, Mabel had been a WEATHER OBSERVER FOR THE NATIONAL WEATHER SERVICE SINCE 1944. During the recent winters, when Mabel moved into Creede, her brother took over that responsibility.


Even with all of Mabel's accomplishments, the ranch remained her main focus. Charles Steele said, "When she moved to Creede for the winters she could barely wait to get out here again when the snow began to thaw. She loved her ranch."

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







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
