

NATIONAL COOPERATIVE OBSERVER is prepared, funded, and distributed by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) and is provided free of charge to Cooperative Observers.

Photographs are taken by NWS employees unless otherwise noted. Narratives are prepared and submitted by the NWS. Narratives are edited only for grammatical errors, space limitations, and consistency.

The Cooperative Observers Climatological Network was created in 1890. The program is currently administered by the National Weather Service, a line office of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, an agency within the Department of Commerce. One of the responsibilities of the National Weather Service is to take meteorological observations which are used to record the climate conditions of the United States. The National Weather Service relies heavily on a vast network of cooperative weather observer volunteers to achieve this objective.

The National Weather Service determines where observations are needed and furnishes standard meteorological instruments to individuals who volunteer their time to take and record daily observations of the weather. Currently, there are about 8000 published volunteer observing stations located in the United States and its territories. In addition to the thousands of cooperative observations stations operated by individuals, many are maintained by institutions and commercial firms (universities, utility companies, etc.). All cooperative observers submit a monthly report summarizing daily weather observations. These contributions to the climate record of the United States are invaluable.


NATIONAL CLIMATIC DATA CENTER MOVES TO NEW BUILDING

On the same day as NOAA's 25th anniversary, the National Climatic Data Center in Asheville, N.C., celebrated a building dedication of its new home in the Federal Plaza Building. Diana Josephson, deputy under secretary for oceans and atmosphere, was keynote speaker and cut a ribbon opening the new center.

Several hundred employees and retirees heard Josephson describe NOAA's history and promise for the furture. She praised NCDC's role in providing climatological services to the nation and the world and noted that NCDC had more than 311,000 user contacts within the past year, ranging from plain people to the largest Fortune 500 compaines and from legal investigations to national defense.

Josephson recalled how NCDC's environment had changed from punched cards to disks and tapes, from daily to six-second and one-minute observations, and from 16mm black-and-white radar film to terabytes of NEXRAD data. She predicted that NCDC will continue to play a major role in fulfilling NOAA's mission.



The museum is a joint effort of NCDC, the Air Force and U.S. Navy for commemoration of the history of climatology and observation of meteorological events.

The Southern Region's Cooperative Program will miss this leader and we wish him all our best as he embarks on this new career - retirement.







Tom Sinclair, Central Regional Cooperative Program Manager retires

Central Region Cooperative Program Manager, Thomas P. Sinclair, retired from the National Weather Service on September 30, 1995, bringing to a close more than 38 years of Federal Service.

Tom graduated from Chariton, Iowa, High School in 1955 and immediately enlisted in the U.S. Air Force where he spent the next 21 years and eight months of his life and where he got his start in the weather business. Tom completed the Air Force Weather Observer course, the Weather Forecaster course, and the Weather Superintendent course. Tom served at a variety of Air Force bases in the United States and around the world. His service assignments took him to both coasts of the United States, Germany, Greenland, and Vietnam.

Retiring from the Air Force in June 1977, Tom returned to school to complete his studies and graduated from Bellevue (Nebraska) College in 1978. He worked for a short time as an industrial engineer in Omaha with Mutual of Omaha Insurance.

Tom enrolled in graduate school at the University of Nebraska in 1979, but dropped out to accept a position as Meteorological Technician for the National Weather Service in 1980. He began his Weather Service career as a Substation Network Specialist, now known as Cooperative Program Manager, at Omaha in 1980 and remained until 1991 when he moved to Kansas City and became the Central Region Cooperative Program Manager.

Cooperative Program duties were definitely to Tom's liking; he very much enjoyed the Cooperative Observers and became good friends with many of them. To Tom, every cooperative observer was extremely interesting; they all had stories to tell. It was especially satisfying for Tom when he was able to visit with Ed Stoll and Ruby Stufft, who both have "National Awards" named after them. All the observers were so kind and he loved their hospitality.

Tom and Gwen, his wife of 34 years, are spending their retirement in St. Cloud, Minnesota. Plans for the future include fishing (we have already heard a few stories of the "big ones" he has caught this past winter), traveling, visiting their daughter, Nancy, in Cincinnati, and spoiling their two grandchildren. Floyd F. Gray receives Edward H. Stoll Award

Volunteer weather observer Floyd F. Gray of Scottsburg, IN, received the coveted Edward H. Stoll Award for 50 years of outstanding weather observations. Floyd F. Gray, one of the most outstanding weather observers for the National Weather Service in Indiana history, was honored at the Kiwanis Club of Scottsburg.

Floyd Gray has dedicated his life to recording weather observations. At 16, he began recording daily weather observations on his own. It wasn't until 1946 that he was selected by the Weather Bureau to be the official cooperative observer in Scottsburg. Being well acquainted with the "privileges" of the previous observer, Gray was more than ready to enlist. Now 50 years later, the interest and zeal of weather observing has not waned in the heart of Floyd Gray

Mr. Gray has already received the two most coveted awards that can be bestowed on cooperative weather observers. In 1987, Gray received the John Campanius Holm Award and in 1992, he received the most prestigious Thomas Jefferson Award.










