

Mississippi River Flooding Continues



Message of the Day:

- Current crest forecasts do not include any precipitation over the weekend and next week.
- Confidence is high in reaching the current crest forecasts.
- Crests will likely go a little higher due to precipitation over the next week.
- The Mississippi will remain high or in flood through the Memorial Day Weekend.

Important Forecast Changes:



A narrow band of heavy snow is expected Saturday from northern Iowa into southern Wisconsin. Runoff from snowmelt will cause a slightly higher and delayed crest on the Mississippi. More rain, possibly heavy, is expected Sunday night through Thursday.

Mississippi Flood Crest

Final snowmelt combined with runoff from heavy rain is moving down the Mississippi River

- River levels are rising from LD11 down to Burlington. Downstream of Burlington river levels will begin rising Saturday.
- Above normal rainfall in the next 2 weeks will likely result in additional rises or a much slower rate of fall. The extent of the changes is uncertain.
- The Mississippi will remain high or in flood through Memorial Day Weekend.



Crest is moving down the Mississippi River.





Current Soil Moisture

Soil Moisture: remains very high to saturated across the region despite the spring green-up.

A slow improvement in soil moisture continues across lowa and northern Illinois


The entire region remains very susceptible to additional rises from heavy rains.







- Accumulating snow Saturday from northern Iowa into southern Wisconsin.
- Runoff from snowmelt will cause a slightly higher and delayed crest on the Mississippi.

Forecast Rainfall Sunday night through Thursday




- April 26th, 2019 12:33 PM CDT

 - Location and amounts of heavy rain critical to future crest forecasts.


