


NWS Quad Cities Flood Update April 29, 2019



More Heavy Rain and Flooding on the Way



What

Rounds of showers & storms to produce more heavy rain. Widespread 2-4 inches and locally higher amounts possible.

When

This morning through Wednesday

Impacts

- Ponding water
- Possible *flash flooding* and urban flooding.
- Higher **river** & stream flooding.

Main Points

- Dubuque through Bellevue crested over the weekend. Bellevue crest being reached today.
- Rainfall Sunday night into Monday caused the Mississippi River to respond quickly.
- Runoff from the past 24 hours will cause levels to rise to higher levels with a delayed crest.
- More rain is expected, possibly heavy, Tuesday into Wednesday.
 This rain is NOT in the forecast that was updated this morning. Expect locations near and downstream of the crest to be impacted by the rainfall in the next 48 hours.
- Crests WILL be higher than early April and may be drawn out.
- Another threat for heavy rains early next week.
- The entire region remains very susceptible to additional river rises with heavy rains.
- The longer the rivers stay at high levels, the more chances there will be to have heavy rains and then subsequent river rises.

Current Warnings New Tributary Flooding Expected



Mississippi River – ongoing flooding

Tributary flooding – recent rains and forecast rainfall in the coming week will cause rises and flooding on some rivers.


Expected Tributary Flooding: Iowa

- Lower Wapsipinicon River
- Lower Iowa River Iowa/Missouri
- Lower Des Moines River Illinois
- Rock River
- Green River

Observed Precipitation: 4/22 – 4/29




Precipitation was plentiful across the area this week.

First: widespread 1" to 1.5" with areas over 2" up over northern lowa into southern Wisconsin.

Second: a band of 1.50" to 2" fell from south central lowa into northwest Illinois.


Observed Precipitation: 4/22 – 4/29


Current Soil Moisture



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Day 1 Forecast Precipitation




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Day 2 Forecast Precipitation

Widespread amounts of 1" to 2" expected across the area.

This WILL have an impact to the river levels. Expect forecast levels on the Mississippi River to go up.

Additional tributary flooding or rises also likely.



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Day 2 Excessive Rainfall Outlook






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Forecast Precipitation

(not included in today's river forecasts)




Wednesday and Wednesday Night

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Bottom Line for This Week Forecast crests will be going up.

- Heavy rain possible Tuesday into Wednesday.
 Wet pattern continues into next week.
- Crest will be higher than in early April.
- High river levels will continue through May. Each additional rain will prolong the high levels.

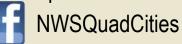
