The average temperature for July in Fresno, in the Central San Joaquin Valley, was the 3rd warmest on record white Bakersfield, in the Southern San Joaquin Valley, was the 4th warmest on record. Due to heat indices as high as 115, heat advisority were issued for the Central and Southern San Joaquin Valley from the 14th through 18th. There were 22 days in Fresno that the maximum temperature equaled or exceeded 100F. For the period from the 12th through the 31st, only one day was less than 100 (99F on the 22nd).

Monsoonal moisture swept northwestward into the south half of California early in the morning of the 23rd and lingered through the 24th. On the 23rd the deserts and mountain areas of Kern County received locally heavy rain from thundershowers that resulted in numerous areas of desert stream flows. Radar estimates indicated 1-hour precipitation amounts of 2-3 inches and storm totals in excess of 4 inches. At Big Pine 0.68" of rain occurred in 15 minutes with a storm total of 1.16." Flooding was reported along Highway 14 near Redrock-Randsburg Road by 1423 PST. Subsequent flooding was reported along Redrock-Randsburg Road to Garlock by 1625 PST. Additional flooding occurred west of Mojave on Willow Springs Road.
