- 12:35 pm EDT Special Weather Statement....thunderstorms over Butler and Warren counties in Ohio....based on CVG Radar.
- 1:10 pm EDT Special Weather Statement....thunderstorms moved east of Hamilton, Butler, and Warren counties in Ohio....based on CVG Radar.
- 4:00 pm EDT Tornado Warning....valid until 5:00 pm for persons in Butler and Warren counties in Ohio....based on hook echoes on WSO CVG Radar and reports of funnels in SE Indiana along the Ohio River heard over the Indiana NAWAS.

- 4:05 pm EDT Tornado Warning....valid until 5:15 pm EDT for Boone County, Kentucky and Hamilton County in Ohio....based again on hook echoes on CVG Radar and Indiana NAWAS reports of funnels.
- 4:20 pm EDT Tornado Warning....valid until 5:20 pm EDT for Franklin County, Indiana....based on hook echo on CVG Radar and funnel reports on the Indiana NAWAS.
- 4:45 pm EDT Tornado Warning....valid until 5:45 pm EDT for Switzerland, Ohio, and Dearborn counties in Indiana, Hamilton and Clermont counties in Ohio, and Boone County in Kentucky....based on hook echoes on CVG Radar.
- 5:30 pm EDT Special Weather Statement....hook-shaped echo 11 miles SW of CVG....based on CVG Radar.
- 5:35 5:45 pm EDT WSS Ivan Winterberg on telephone with WCKY
 Radio giving blow by blow description of tornado
 moving west of the airport through Boone County, KY
 into Hamilton County, Ohio....visual observation.
- 5:40 pm EDT Power Outage.....loss of teletype, radar, incoming telephones, and Indiana and Kentucky NAWAS. Partial loss of Ohio NAWAS. Almost complete breakdown of communications. Chance discovery that outgoing calls could be made via telephones and very weak reception available on Ohio NAWAS.
- 5:45 pm EDT PA John Robinson called the three major network TV stations in the Cincinnati area informing them of last position of the tornado in Boone and Hamilton counties....based on last visual CVG Radar observation.
- 5:45 5:50 pm EDT Phone calls to radio stations in Boone and Hamilton counties....stations WLYK (Milford), WHKK (Erlanger), and WCNW (Fairfield).....last tornado location and movement....based on last CVG Radar observation.
- 6:30 pm EDT Tornado Warning....called WSFO CLE and had them relay a warning for Hamilton County in Ohio and Boone County in Kentucky....valid until 7:30 pm EDT..... based on FAA CVG Radar.
- 7:00 pm EDT Tornado Warning....called WSFO CLE and had them relay a warning for Clermont County in Ohio valid until 8:00 pm EDT.....based on pilot report of funnel aloft in Campbell County, KY and FAA Radar.
- 8:53 pm EDT Power back on.

- 9:15 pm EDT Severe Thunderstorm Warning....valid until 10:30 pm EDT for Boone, Kenton, and Campbell Counties in KY and Hamilton and Clermont counties in Ohio.....based on WSS Kenneth Dixon report of 3/4" hail in southern Kenton County and CVG Radar.
- 10:30 pm EDT Tornado Warning....valid until 11:30 pm EDT for Brown, Adams, and Highland counties in Ohio....based on hook echo over Falmouth, Kentucky observed on CVG Radar.
- 10:30 pm EDT Special Weather Statement....general thunderstorm statement for Tri-State area....based on CVG Radar.
- 11:35 pm EDT Special Weather Statement and Weather Radar Summary
 Tri-State radar summary of strong echoes...based on
 CVG Radar.
- 12:20 am EDT Tornado Warning....valid until 1:20 am EDT for Hamilton County in Ohio, Switzerland and Dearborn counties in Indiana, and northern Boone County in Kentucky....based on hook echo observed on CVG Radar.
- 12:35 am EDT Severe Weather Statement and Weather Radar Summary general strong echo report for Ohio and Kentucky.....based on CVG Radar.
- 1:15 am EDT Severe Weather Bulletin....cancellation of Tornado Warning....based on CVG Radar.
- 2:35 am EDT Severe Weather Statement and Weather Radar Summary general heavy thunderstorm summary for the Tri-State area....based on CVG Radar.
- 2. Copies of Warnings and Statements issued....copies of appropriate pages of Warning Logs and Station operation logs. Copies of warnings, station operation log, and radar logs attached. NAWAS, telephone, and most of radar contacts not documented....time was of essence....effectiveness of warnings indicates a superb coordination job was accomplished.

4. Other Relevant Information:

Power outage from 5:40 pm EDT until 8:53 pm EDT primary reason for lack of warnings and statements during that time period. Fortunately, the extremely critical period between 4:30 pm EDT and 5:45 pm EDT was well covered in advance by warnings which had alerted almost the entire warning area to the possibility of severe weather. Enough credit cannot be given to the WSR-57 at CVG and the men on duty....the performance of the radar while power was available and the warnings issued saved many lives.
