

NEW ORLEANS WEATHER BUREAU ADVISORY NO 8 AUDREY JUNE 27 1957 4 AM CST.

HURRICANE AUEREY WAS ABOUT 70 MILES SOUTH OF PORT ARTHUR TEXAS NEAR LATITUDE 29 LONGITUDE 94 AT 4 AM CST...1000Z...MOVING NORTHWARD 15 TO 20 MPH. THE CENTER IS EXPECTED TO REACH PORT ARTHUR AREA BY MID MORNING WITH WINDS OF 100 MPH OR SLIGHTLY HIGHER AND TIDES OF 9 FEET.

GALES EXTEND OUT 150 TO 200 MILES TO NTMTH AND EAST OF CENTER AND 50 MILES SOUTHWEST.

TIDES WILL REACH 5 TO 9 FEET TODAY FROM HIGH ISLAND TEXAS TO MORGAN CITY LA AND 3 TO 6 FEET ELSEWHERE FROM FREEPORT TEX TO BILOXI MISS. PRECAUTIONS AGAINST THESE HIGH TIDES SHOULD BE CONTINUED. FOUR TO EIGHT INCH RAINS AND HIGH WINDS WILL SPREAD INLAND THRU EXTREME EAST TEXAS AND WESTERN LOUISIANA TODAY.

HURRICANE WARNINGS ARE DISPLAYED FROM HIGH ISLAND TEXAS EASTWARD ALONG THE ENTIRE LOUISIANA COAST AND STORM WARNINGS AT GALVESTON. ZINDS ALONG E SOUTHEEST LOUISIANA COAST WILL OT REACH HURRICANE X FORCE BUT ROUGH SEAS AND HIGH TIDES JUSTIFY CONTINUING THE WARNING. SMALL CRAFT SROM CORPUS CHRISTI TO PENSACOLA SHOULD REMAIN IN PORT.

CENTER WAS ABOUT MIDWAY BETWEEN BEAUMONT TEXAS AND LAKE CHARLES LA
NEAR LATITUDE 30.3 LONGITUDE 93.7 AT 10 AM CST...1600Z... MOVING
NORTHWARD ABOUT 15 MPH. LAKE CHARLES LA AND ORANGE TEX REPORTED
WINDS OF 100 MPH. WINDS OF 75 MPH OR BETTER ARE EXPECTED TO
CONTINUE NEAR THE CENTER REST OF TODAY AS IT MOVES NORTHWARD ALONG
THE TEXAS LOUISIANA BORDER ACCOMPANIED BY 4 TO 8 INCH RAINS.

TIDES WILL REMAIN DANGEROUSLY HIGH ALONG LOUISIANA COAST AND FALL
TONIGHT. ALL INTERESTS SHOULD CONTINUE PRECAUTIONS AGAINST THESE
HIGH TIDESM GALES SQUALLS AND SEAS WILL GRADUALLY SUBSIDE ALONG
THE COAST THIS AFTERNOON. SMALL CRAFT FROM CORPUS CHRISTI TO PENSACOLA
SHOULD REMAIN IN PORT UNTIL WIND AND SEAS SUBSIDE.

ALL WARNINGS WILL BE LOWERED LATER TODAY.

HURRICANE AUDREY HAS CONTINUED TO WEAKEN RAPIDLY AND AT 10 PM CST
..0400Z.. WAS CENTERED 10 MILES NORTH OF MONROE LOUISIANA.
IT IS MOVING NORTHEASTWARD 18 MPH.

HIGHEST WINDS ARE 50 MPH NEAR THE CENTER.

AUDREY WILL CONTINUE TO WEAKEN AS IT MOVES NORTHEASTWARD ABOUT 20 MPH
INTO THE LOWER OHIO VALLEY FRIDAY. HEAVY RAINS TWO TO LOCALLY FIVE
INCHES ARE EXPECTED NEAR THE CENTER IN SOUTHEAST ARKANSAS AND NORTHWEST
MISSISSIPPI TONIGHT SPREADING INTO WESTERN TENNESSEE AND WESTERN
KENTUCKY FRIDAY WITH SOME FLOODING LIKELY.

TIDES WILL CONTINUE TO FALL AND WINDS AND SEAS WILL DIMINISH ALONG THE
COAST THROUGH FRIDAY. SMALL CRAFT CORPUS CHRISTI TO PENSACOLA SHOULD
REMAIN IN PORT UNTIL WINDS AND SEAS SUBSIDE.

THIS IS THE LAST ADVISORY ON AUDREY BUT BULLETIN WILL BE ISSUED EVERY
6 HOURS UNTIL THE HEAVY RAIN THREAT HAS ENDED WITH THIS STORM. NEXT
BULLETIN AT 4 AM CST.

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NEW ORLEANS WEATHER BUREAU BULLETIN 4 AM CST JUNE 28 1957

AUDREY CONTINUES TO WEAKEN AND AT 4 AM CST THE CENTER WAS IN NORTHERN MISSISSIPPI ABOUT 60 MILES SOUTH OF MEMPHIS TENN. MOVING NORTHEASTWARD 20 MPH. WINDS UP TO 40 MPH ARE OCCURRING NEAR THE CENTER AND OUTWARD FOR ABOUT 300 MILES IN THE SE QUADRANT.

WINDS SEAS AND TIDES ALONG THE CENTRAL GULF COAST ARE RATHER HIGH BUT WILL SLOWLY DIMINISH TODAY. SMALL CRAFT SHOULD REMAIN IN PORT UNTIL WINDS AND SEAS SUBSIDE.

LOCALLY HEAVY RAINS OF 2 TO 5 INCHES HAVE OCCURRED NEAR THE CENTER AND ARE EXPECTED TO SPREAD ACROSS TENNESSEE AND KENTUCKY TODAY AND EARLY TONIGHT AND INTO THE UPPR OHIO VALLEY TONIGHT AND EARLY SATURDAY. INTEREST IN THESE AREAS SHOULD WATCH FOR POSSIBLE FLOOD WARNING.

THE NEXT BULLETIN WILL BEISSUED BY THE WEATHER BUREAU IN CHICAGO AT 11 SM CST. KRAFT WEATHER BUREAU NEW ORLEANS

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THE WEAKENING REMAINS OF HURRICANE AUDREY SITUATED OVER SOUTHEASTERN OHIO AT 5 PM CST FRIDAY IS EXPECTED TO MOVE NORTHEASTWARD ACROSS NORTHWESTERN PENNSYLVANIA AND WESTERN NEW YORK.

STRONG WINDS ARE NO LONGER A MAJOR FEATURE OF THIS STORM ALTHOUGH SOME SEVERE THUNDERSTORMS WITH LOCAL DAMAGING WINDS ARE ASSOCIATED WITH IT.

RAIN THROUGH MISSOURI ILLINOIS INDIANA AND OHIO WITH THE LARGEST AMOUNT REPORTED AS 9.50 INCHES AT PARIS ILLINOIS. AMOUNTS OF 5 TO 9 INCHES WERE COMMON IN CENTRAL ILLINOIS.

THE COMBINED STORM IS NOW MOVING MORE RAPIDLY AND PRECIPITATION AMOUNTS ARE EXPECTED TO BE DECREASING BUT LOCALLY HEAVY AMOUNTS OF TWO TO THREE INCHES CAN BE EXPECTED TONIGHT IN PORTION OF OHIO WEST VIRGINIA PENNSYLVANIA AND NEW YORK.

AT MIDNIGHT EST.
