

## TROPICAL STORM ARLENE May 28-31, 1959

PRELIMINARY REPORT AND THE ADVISORIES ISSUED



## PRELIMINARY REPORT ON TROPICAL STORM ARLENE MAY 28 TO MAY 31, 1959

Tropical Storm Arlene formed in the central Gulf of Mexico Thursday, May 28, 1959 under a low pressure center aloft which had been located over the western Caribbean several days earlier. The storm moved northwestward for the first 12 hours and then westward for 12 hours. It remained nearly stationary through the night of May 29-30 south of the central Louisiana coast and then moved northward, with the center going inland about midway between Weeks Island and Pt. Au Fer, Louisiana Saturday afternoon, May 30.

Highest winds reported in the storm were 40 to 50 miles per hour on the Louisiana coast. Lowest central pressure reported was 1001 millibars (29.56 inches) at Pt. Au Fer and Weeks Island. Several ships and Navy reconnaissance aircraft also reported a central pressure of around 1000 millibars while the storm was over the Gulf of Mexico.

The storm produced locally heavy rains through the southeastern portions of Louisiana and Mississippi. Moisant International Airport (New Orleans) received 11.09 inches in 24 hours and Houma, Louisiana 11.35 inches from 5 p.m. Saturday to 10:30 a.m. Sunday and 13.13 inches in three days.

One man is reported to have drowned in the surf at Galveston. No estimate of damage from flooding is available at this time (June 1, 1959).

A TROPICAL STORM IS DEVELOPING IN THE CENTRAL GULF OF MEXICO. AT 9 PM CST 0300Z IT WAS LOCATED NEAR LATITUDE 26 LONGITUDE 88 OR ABOUT 300 STATUTE MILES SOUTH SOUTHEAST OF NEW ORLEANS. IT IS EXPECTED TO MOVE TOWARD THE NORTHWEST 10 TO 15 MPH. SCATTERED SQUALLS ARE OCCURRING OVER MUCH OF THE NORTH CENTRAL GULF OF MEXICO WITH WINDS UP TO 40 MPH IN HEAVIER SQUALLS TO NORTH OF THE CENTER.

SOME FURTHER INCREASE IN SIZE AND INTENSITY IS EXPECTED TONIGHT WITH HIGHEST WINDS AROUND 50 MPH IN HEAVY SQUALLS BY EARLY FRIDAY.

TROPICAL STORM ARLENE WAS ABOUT 240 STATUTE MILES SOUTH SOUTHEAST OF NEW ORLEANS AT MIDNIGHT MOVING TOWARDS THE NORTHWEST 10 TO 15 MPH. IT HAS INCREASED A LITTLE IN SIZE AND INTENSITY DURING THE PAST FEW HOURS. HIGHEST WINDS ARE ESTIMATED 45 MPH IN HEAVIER SQUALLS TO NORTH OF THE CENTER. BURRWOOD LA REPORTED GUSTS TO 35 MPH.

SOME FURTHER INCREASE IN SIZE AND INTENSITY IS EXPECTED DURING THE NEXT 12 HOURS AS TROPICAL STORM ARLENE CONTINUES MOVING TOWARD THE NORTHWEST.

AT 4 AM ...1000Z...TROPICAL STORM ARLENE WAS CENTERED NEAR LATITUDE 27.0 LONGITUDE 89.3 OR ABOUT 200 STATUTE MILES SOUTH SOUTHEAST OF NEW ORLEANS. IT WAS MOVING NORTHWEST 12 TO 15 MPH. HIGHEST WINDS ARE ESTIMATED 40 TO 50 MPH IN SCATTERED SQUALLS EXTENDING OUT 150 MILES TO NORTH OF THE CENTER.

CONTINUED NORTHWEST MOVEMENT AT ABOUT 15 MPH IS EXPECTED WITH THE CENTER MOVING INLAND ON THE LOUISIANA COAST LATE TODAY BUT THE HEAVIEST SQUALLS SHOULD OCCUR ALONG THE MISSISSIPPI SOUND AND SOUTHEAST LOUISIANA COASTAL AREA TODAY.

HIGHEST WINDS ARE ESTIMATED 50 MPH WITHIN 50 MILES OF THE CENTER AND IN A FEW HEAVIER SQUALLS NORTH OF THE CENTER. WINDS ARE EXPECTED TO REACH GALE FORCE ON CENTRAL AND MOST OF THE WEST LOUISIANA COAST BY NOON TODAY. TROPICAL STORM ARLENE IS NOW APPROACHING THE WEST LOUISIANA COAST AND IS EXPECTED TO MOVE INLAND IN THIS AREA LATE TODAY. WINDS ALONG THE COAST IN THIS AREA ARE EXPECTED TO REACH GALE FORCE BY NOON AND SQUALLS WILL INCREASE THIS AFTERNOON. RESIDENTS IN THE COASTAL PARISHES OF CAMERON AND VERMILION SHOULD TAKE IMMEDIATE PRECAUTIONS FOR THE PROTECTION OF LIFE AND PROPERTY AGAINST WINDS OF 35 TO 50 MPH IN SQUALLS HEAVY RAINS AND TIDES 2 TO 4 FT. HIGHEST WINDS ARE ESTIMATED 50 MPH WITHIN 50 MILES OF THE CENTER. GALE FORCE WINDS ARE EXPECTED MAINLY ON THE CENTRAL LOUISIANA COAST FOR THE NEXT FEW HOURS.

ARLENE IS EXPECTED TO CONTINUE NORTHWARD ABOUT 10 MPH WITH THE CENTER MOVING INLAND NEAR VERMILION BAY THIS AFTERNOON. THIS STORM SHOULD WEAKEN RAPIDLY AFTER MOVING INLAND BUT LOCALLY HEAVY RAINFALL IS LIKELY IN THE LOWER MISSISSIPPI VALLEY AS IT MOVES INTO THAT AREA TONIGHT AND SUNDAY.

AT 1 PM CST THE CENTER OF TROPICAL STORM ARLENE WAS APPROACHING THE CENTRAL LOUISIANA COAST AND WAS CENTERED ABOUT 60 MILES SOUTH OF LAFAYETTE. WINDS UP TO 50 MPH ARE OCCURRING ALONG THE CENTRAL LOUISIANA COAST WITH ROUGH SEAS AND TIDES 2 TO 3 FEET ABOVE NORMAL.

TROPICAL STORM ARLENE MOVED INLAND ALONG THE CENTRAL LOUISIANA COAST THIS AFTERNOON AND AT 10 PM CST THE CENTER WAS BETWEEN LAFAYETTE AND BATON ROUGE LOUISIANA. THE RADAR SHOWS SOME AREAS OF LOCALLY HEAVY RAIN ACCOMPANYING THE STORM BUT ONLY MODERATE WINDS ARE REPORTED WITH IT.

REMNANTS OF TROPICAL STORM ARLENE ARE WEAKLY DEFINED BUT IT IS LIKELY NEAR MCCOMB MISSISSIPPI. IT IS DRIFTING VERY SLOWLY NORTHEASTWARD AND HAS CAUSED LOCALLY HEAVY RAINS IN SOUTHEAST LOUISIANA. THE KENNER AREA RECEIVED NEARLY EIGHT AND ONE HALF INCHES RAINFALL SINCE MIDNIGHT. THE RADAR SCOPE STILL CONTINUES TO SHOW HEAVY RAIN TO THE WEST AND RAIN SHOULD CONTINUE INTO THE NIGHT WITH A VERY SLOW IMPROVEMENT THIS AFTERNOON AND TONIGHT.
