A thunderstorm which produced winds in excess of 55 MPH and large hail moved across the District between 6:00 PM and 7:00 PM EDT on the 7th. In Southeast, 256 trees were downed onto roads, cars, buildings, and phone and power poles. Where trees were uprooted, sewer lines, large piles of earth, and concrete were also pulled up. In Southwest, trees were downed onto cars at Arena Stage on Main Avenue. In Northeast, over 100 trees were downed in a swath from Benning Road to the Maryland border. Nearly 16,000 city customers lost power after over 100 wires were downed by trees. Quarter sized hail fell on Capitol Hill and Northeast. Half dollar sized hail fell in Southeast and pea sized hail was reported in Southwest. A wind gust of 45 MPH and dime sized hail was observed at Washington National Airport.

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Scattered thunderstorms developed during the hot and humid afternoon of the 1st. These thunderstorms produced very heavy rainfall, gusty winds, and frequent lightning. In Frederick County, the chimney of a two-story home in Jefferson was struck by lightning. A fire resulted which heavily damaged the structure. A heavy downpour sent Martin's Creek out of its banks in Brunswick. Rushing water from the creek inundated nearby buildings. A city building made of cinder blocks had the rear and part of a side wall washed away. Cars, trucks, and other equipment stored inside were also damaged. Some culvert pipes were washed out and a foot bridge and a fence were washed away. A home across the street from the creek also reported flood damaged to appliances. In Montgomery County, 2.00 inches of rain flooded streets in Damascus. The Potomac Water Treatment Plant reported 1.60 inches of rain. In Carroll County, a wind gust of 41 MPH was recorded in Manchester.

Thunderstorms that produced brief heavy rainfall and gusty winds moved across south central Maryland during the afternoon of the 4th. In Charles County, trees and power lines were downed and hail of unknown size fell. In Anne Arundel County, a total of 2.70 inches of rain fell in Annapolis. Road flooding was reported in Mayo and Potomac. In Calvert County, 2.37 inches of rain fell on Solomon's Island. In St. Mary's County, 1.67 inches of rain fell in California.

Numerous roads were flooded and streets and basements were damaged by rapidly rising water.

A thunderstorm that produced heavy rainfall remained fairly stationary over Allegany County from around 10:00 AM to 2:00 PM EDT on the 6th. Flash flooding resulted after a total of 3.19 inches of rain fell in Frostburg and Pinto and 2.48 inches fell in Cumberland. Hardest hit communities included Westernport, Barton, Lonaconing, and Frostburg. In Westernport, Ross Street, Riordan Road, and Lincoln Drive were damaged by rapidly moving water and 46 basements were flooded. Main street became a makeshift river and after the water subsided piles of mud debris had to be removed. Rising water threatened Westernport Elementary School. In Barton, 2 streets were damaged and 25 basements were flooded. In Lonaconing, 14 basements were flooded. Flooded basements were reported in Frostburg and a toll bridge and Bowery Street were submerged. Flooding was also reported near the junction of the Savage River Dam and the Potomac River. Across the County, Route 135 and old Route 36 were closed by high water.

Scattered thunderstorms moved across central Maryland during the afternoon and early evening hours of the 7th. These storms produced winds in excess of 55 MPH, frequent lightning, and hail. In Frederick County, an apartment complex in Frederick was hit by lightning. The resulting fire left 4 families homeless and resulted in \$750,000 in damage to the attic. In Howard County, lightning fires damaged over \$100,000 worth of property in Columbia. Power was knocked out at the Howard County Fair for 12 hours which deactivated well water pumps and made taking care of animals difficult. High winds downed utility poles and wires in Ellicott City. In Montgomery County, dime sized hail fell in Damascus. High winds downed over 400 trees and power lines across the county. In Prince George's County, several trees and power lines were downed in Capitol Heights, Seat Pleasant, Suitland, and Upper Marlboro. Quarter sized hail was reported in Forestville and small hail was reported in Morningside and Suitland. A utility repairman restoring power in Upper Marlboro was critically injured after being shocked by a live electrical wire around 8:45 AM EDT on the 8th. Over 31,000 customers across central Maryland lost power as a direct result of the storms.

As the storm passed over Lothian, it produced a brief wind gust of over 55 MPH which destroyed two buildings and an area of crops on a farm. A garage made of cinder blocks and a wooden shed were both ripped apart by the sudden burst of wind. Items inside the structures were thrown up to 300 yards away. Crops in a nearby field were uprooted and were either found lying in a circle or blown onto the roof of a farmhouse.

Two house fires were started by lightning.

An area of showers and thunderstorms moved across Maryland between 2:30 PM and 8:00 PM EDT on the 27th. These storms produced very heavy rainfall, small hail, frequent lighting, and gusty winds. In Anne Arundel County, the police department received 15 calls for either downed trees or power lines after the storms moved through. Nearly 10,000 customers in the area lost power. In Montgomery County, two homes were damaged by lightning fires. One home received \$80,000 in damage to its attic and the other home received \$15,000 in damage. A total of 1.74 inches of rain fell in Damascus. Little Bennet Creek flooded Kings Valley Road temporarily after the deluge. In Prince George's County, a wind gust of 50 MPH was estimated at Beltsville. Rainfall totals across the county included 1.74 inches at Lake Arbor, 1.71 inches in Beltsville, and 1.67 inches at Harry Truman Drive. Street flooding was reported in College Park. In Frederick County, pea to bean sized hail fell in Wolfsville. A total of 2.70 inches of rain fell in Thurmont. In Carroll County, minor flooding was reported in Westminster. Rainfall totals included 2.70 inches in Westminster and 2.25 inches in Finksburg. In Baltimore County, just over 2 inches of rain fell in Towson. In Harford County, 1.83 inches fell at Conowingo Dam and a wind gust of 48 MPH was reported in Aberdeen.

Back Creek had overflowed its banks and damaged a portion of the roadway, closing it for several days. A total of 2.04 inches of rain fell in Winchester. In Fauquier County, 2.17 inches of rain was reported in The Plains. In Prince William County, 1.58 inches of rain fell on Bull Run Mountain.

Scattered thunderstorms formed over the northern half of Virginia during the afternoon of the 4th. These storms produced frequent lightning, hail, winds in excess of 55 MPH, and very heavy rainfall. In Nelson County, a produce shed burned to the ground after being hit by lightning. In Shenandoah County, a heavy downpour caused water to cover streets and sidewalks in Woodstock. In Orange County, quarter sized hail fell in Orange and a wind gust of 45 MPH was recorded at the Orange Airport. Trees and power lines were downed countywide and just across the border into Madison County. Eight streets in Orange were blocked by downed trees and one car was damaged by a felled tree. In northern Spotsylvania County, an inch of rain fell in 30 minutes along the Rappahannock River. In Prince William County, heavy downpours flooded several county roads and one car was found partially submerged by law enforcement. Route 1 was closed by high water for an hour. In addition, gusty winds downed a tree in Manassas.

Scattered thunderstorms that produced heavy rainfall moved across northern Virginia during the late morning and early afternoon of the 6th. In Frederick County, Back Creek overflowed its banks near Gore. Route 704, Shawnee Trail, Tomahawk Trail, and Back Creek Road were closed by high water for 4 hours. Over 350 boy scouts, pack leaders, and staff members at Camp Rock Enon were stranded after Back Creek flooded the access road. A total of 2.34 inches of rain fell in Gore, 1.79 inches fell in Winchester, and

Scattered thunderstorms developed across northeast Virginia during the hot and humid afternoon and evening of the 7th. These thunderstorms produced winds in excess of 55 MPH, large hail, frequent lightning, and heavy rainfall. In Loudoun County, trees and power lines were downed in Middleburg. Heavy downpours flooded Route 50 between Middleburg and Aldie and in the town of Middleburg. Dulles International Airport recorded 2.32 inches of rainfall and a wind gust of 48 MPH. In Fairfax County, quarter sized hail fell in McLean and Wolftrap Park, nickel to quarter sized hail fell in Herndon, dime sized hail fell in Reston, and pea sized hail fell at Tyson's Corner. A 53 MPH wind gust and 1.61 inches of rain was reported in Herndon where 3 trees were downed. Over 70,000 customers lost power across northern Virginia as a direct result of the storms. In Falls Church, a 33 year old man was killed by lightning at the West Falls Church Metro Station. The victim was standing near a tree that was struck by lightning at the bus stop on the east side of the station. High winds downed over a dozen trees onto roads, cars, and structures across the city. Lightning struck a satellite dish at a local radio station, frying sophisticated computer equipment. Nickel sized hail was also reported. In Arlington County, nearly 400 trees were downed onto roads, power lines, homes, and cars. One house was completely destroyed by a large downed tree. Nickel sized hail fell in downtown Arlington and a wind gust of 45 MPH was recorded at Washington National Airport. Lightning struck an antenna at the Arlington County Emergency Communications Center and knocked out the entire radio dispatch system temporarily. In the city of Alexandria, several downed trees and power lines blocked roads and one tree landed on a car.

A cold front moved across the region on the evening of the 9th. Thunderstorms that developed ahead and along the front produced winds in excess of 55 MPH, hail, frequent lightning, and isolated tornadoes. In Highland County, trees were downed in Monterey and across the county. A lightning fire destroyed a barn on Route 637 near Blue Grass. In Augusta County, several trees were downed and structures were damaged by high wind. A wind gust of 65 MPH was recorded in Staunton. Eight trees were downed onto city roads and seven trees were downed onto a golf course. One downed tree damaged a brick wall at the Woodrow Wilson Birthplace. Windows were blown out on two buildings and the roof of an apartment building was damaged. In Stuarts Draft, a downed tree damaged a house and a tractor and high wind removed the aluminum roof from a barn. In Waynesboro, trees and power lines were downed. In Rockingham County, trees and power lines were downed in Timberville, Elkton, Keezletown, and Rawley Springs. Some trees were felled across roads and one tree fell onto a car in Keezletown. Hail fell in Timberville.

In Shenandoah County, an F0 tornado briefly touched down on property adjacent to Red Bank Road near Bowman's Crossing. The 15 yard wide twister started by sucking up water on the banks of the North Fork of the Shenandoah River. Next, it moved onshore and traveled north for two tenths of a mile. It downed or snapped five trees and flattened part of a corn field before dissipating. Straight line winds downed trees and power lines near New Market and Mt. Jackson. A wind gust of 42 MPH was recorded in Edinburg and hail fell in New Market. In Rappahannock County, trees were downed in Sperryville. In Page County, downed trees and power lines blocked roads in Stanley. A wind gust of 41 MPH was recorded in Luray where a downed tree punctures the roof of a house. In Albemarle County, several trees were downed. In Greene County, trees were downed in Standardville. In Culpeper, trees were downed in Culpeper. In Madison County, an F1 tornado touched down just east of Madison. The 50 yard wide twister was on the ground for one half mile and caused nearly \$100,000 in damage. It downed trees onto houses and one tree punched a hole into a roof. Two cars were hit by fallen trees and one barn lost its roof. Straight line winds downed trees in Etlan and Madison. In Orange County, a wind gust of 45 MPH was recorded at the Orange County Airport. Trees and power lines were downed in Orange.

In Frederick County, several trees and 20 power lines were downed from Hayfield to Shawneeland. Several roads were blocked by felled trees. Two houses were damaged by downed trees in Shawneeland. A barn roof and side were blown apart near Hayfield.

Dime sized hail fell in Stephenson and Winchester. A tree was downed onto a power line on Amherst Street and lightning started an attic fire in Winchester where a wind gust of 40 MPH was recorded. Abrams Creek overflowed its banks in Winchester after one half inch of rain fell in 20 minutes. In Warren County, trees and power lines were downed in Warrenton and at the Warren County Airport. In Loudoun County, a wind gust of 66 MPH was recorded at the National Weather Service office on the north grounds of Dulles International Airport.
