Hurricane Florence brought record rainfall, along with powerful storm surge and wind as the slow moving storm battered the North Carolina coast for hours.



- Significant Flooding
- Road Closures
- Significant and prolonged power outages
- Damages to homes and businesses
- Damage to schools
- Displaced residents

1. Make a Plan

Learn your risks to hurricane hazards.

Is your home vulnerable to storm surge?

Do you live in a low lying area or adjacent to a body of water?

Do you live in a mobile home?

Are you electricity dependent due to a medical condition?

Have a predetermined Hurricane Plan tailored to your family's needs.

Include a plan for evacuating and staying at home.

Include special considerations for children, seniors, and pets.

Include a list of emergency contacts (doctor, insurance adjustor, emergency services)

Evacuation

Control Group

Consists of the mayor of each municipality and the chairman of the Carteret County Board of Commissioners.

Evacuation Orders

Typically applied to Zone A which includes Bogue Banks, property adjacent to waterways, downeast Carteret County and low lying or flood prone areas, and mobile home dwellers.

Evacuation zones highlight areas most at risk for storm surge and flooding. **KNOWYOURZONE.NC.GOV**

Evacuation Orders will advise:

Time that evacuation should begin
Time when the evacuation, and all preparations, should be completed
Time when access to Bogue Banks will be controlled
Time when emergency shelters will open and their locations


Evacuation Routes

Hurricane evacuation routes in Carteret County are marked with blue and white evacuation route signs. The evacuation routes out of Carteret County are U.S. Highway 70, NC Highway 101, and NC Highway 58.



Reentry Pass

Each Town determines the distribution policy for their permits. Residents should contact their town halls for specific information on reentry permit policies.



Evacuation Resources

Medically Fragile Registry

Who Is Eligible?

Carteret County residents who:

*Require Transportation to and from a designated emergency shelter.

*Require, within the limits of services provided, assistance with mobility, oxygen, routine medication administration, routine health monitoring.

Shelter in Place

If you decide not to evacuate, make sure you are prepared to ride out the storm.

ANTICIPATE prolonged power outages.

ANTICIPATE communication outages (television, internet, cellular phone).

Emergency responders, law enforcement and fire personnel may not be available until after the storm passes.

Have your emergency kit ready at all times.







Shelter in Place

Staying Safe at Home

STAY INDOORS until the storm is over.

Stay in tune with your local radio or television station and be aware of changing conditions for the possibility of flooding and tornadoes.

Always use a flashlight or battery operated lanterns if the power is out.

If flooding is occurring, get to higher ground or a second level of your home, but make sure you have an escape route.

Do NOT use any electrical appliances, outlets, switches, etc. if flooding is occurring.

<u>NEVER</u> use a generator inside a home or garage and be sure to read the manufacturer's Directions for safe operation.



2. Make a Kit

Plan to be on your own for at least two weeks.

Water (1 gal. per person/day)

Food (non-perishable)

First Aid Kit

Medical Equipment

NOAA Alert Radio

Extra Batteries

Face Covering

Flashlight

Can Opener

Tools

Personal Hygiene Items

Toilet Paper

Pet Supplies

Disinfectant

Fire Extinguisher

Glasses/Eye Care

Cash

Identification

Important Documents

Comfort/ Entertainment

Hand sanitizer


