Subject: Removal of Amber Alerts (SAME code: Child Abduction
 Emergency) from the National Hazards Map Effective
 March 24, 2020

Effective Wednesday, March 24, 2021, the NWS will no longer display Amber Alerts (SAME code: Child Abduction Emergency) on the national Watch, Warning, and Advisory (WWA) map shown here:
<https://www.weather.gov/>

Amber Alerts will appear on the product lists below the national map and to the right of the regional maps, as well as on the local forecast pages within the pink banner at the top of the page.

Currently, the display of an Amber Alert highlights every county within the affected state on the WWA map. As a result, concurrent weather WWA information across the state may not be displayed. To alleviate this issue, and given that Amber Alerts are not environmental hazards, they will no longer highlight the WWA map.

Amber Alert messages will continue to be disseminated through NOAA Weather Radio (NWR), the Emergency Alert System (EAS), Emergency Managers Weather Information Network (EMWIN), and File Transfer Protocol (FTP) services.
