Subject:   Soliciting Feedback through June 26, 2025 on consolidating NWS  
Dissemination Applications, including the stand-alone alerts.weather.gov  
webpage.

The National Weather Service (NWS) is modernizing its dissemination services, including updating and consolidating disparate dissemination applications into more modern, scalable and useful services. As part of this process, the NWS is soliciting comments through June 26, 2025 on the potential retirement of the stand-alone Alerts webpage alerts.weather.gov.

The Alerts webpage offers an alternative way to view data from the operational NWS Application Programming Interface (API) (<https://api.weather.gov/alerts>) service. In other words, the Alerts webpage duplicates some of the functionality already operating as part of the API and the weather.gov website. The NWS would continue to provide all the data available on the Alerts webpage via existing alternative operational systems. An overlap period would allow users time to make the transition.

The Alerts webpage is currently available via the following URLs:

Alternatives for the Alerts webpage include:

1) Retrieve alerts through the API alerts endpoint <https://api.weather.gov/alerts> in GeoJSON, JSON-LD, Atom, or CAP XML. Users that require human-readable plain text format would need to convert from one of the available formats. This option is primarily meant for machine-to-machine communication. The NWS could make sample conversion code available upon request.

2) View human-readable alerts on the Weather.gov website by entering a zip code location or by clicking on areas of the map where there are

active hazards. This option is primarily for web browser users who want to view alert details for a specific area.
