
New Haven

At 12.3 ft MLLW / 5.6 ft MHHW (10/29/2012)



Coastal communities along Southern New Haven County experienced two successive tidal cycles with at least moderate coastal flooding on Monday October 29th. The peak of this surge occurred Monday Night as Sandy made landfall in Southern New Jersey, with widespread major coastal flooding occurring along the Southern New Haven coast. Peak storm tides surpassed water levels from Hurricane Irene in 2011. The record storm tide levels along Western Long Island Sound resulted from a peak storm surge of about 7 to 9 feet that coincided with normal high tides. These storm tides resulted in up to 2 to 5 feet of inundation several blocks inland along Long Island Sound, with a few feet of inundation working north of I-95 in several spots along waterways such as the Housantonic River in Milford, the West River and Quinnipiac River in New Haven, Branford River in Branford, and East River in Guilford.

The most widespread major damage occurred along soundfront communities in Milford and East Haven. Several soundfront homes were completely destroyed in Momaguin in East Haven and Milford Lawn, Morningside, Walnut Beach, and Silver Beach in Milford. Smaller pockets of major damage also occurred in the soundfront communities of Guilford Harbor and Shell Beach areas of Guilford, Saybrook Manor, Clinton Harbor, and Westbrook.

<u>East Haven</u> – Several beach front homes suffered extensive damage from storm surge on <u>Cosey Beach Ave</u>. Estimated 4 to 8 ft of surge. 2 dozen homes damaged with 4 completely destroyed. (1000am 8/28/2011)





Road closed due to flooding on <u>corner of Coe Rd, Hemmingway Rd, and Short Beach Rd</u> due to Farm River Flooding. Water was up to 4 ft deep due to combined surge and heavy rainfall. Significant inundation in <u>Short Beach section</u> with a lot of damage on Little Bay Lane and Beckett Avenue and surrounding streets. Several feet of inundation estimated.

<u>New Haven</u> – Inundation of several feet of water onto <u>Longshore Drive</u> from LI Sound impassable.

1 to 2 ft of inundation across <u>Long Wharf Drive and surrounding properties...including IKEA</u> shopping center. (1000-1100am 8/28/2011)

West Haven - Heavy damage was sustained to several coastal properties in <u>Savin Rock</u> due to storm surge. (1000am 8/28/2011)

<u>Guilford</u> – 2-3 ft inundation into roadway/properties surrounding corner of <u>Water Street & River Street along the West River</u>. (Coastal flood/freshwater) (1000-1100am 8/28/2011)

<u>Branford</u> – Several feet of inundation over <u>Linden Avenue</u> into neighboring properties. Combined wave action caused severe erosion and undermining of roadway with significant damage to about one dozen properties.

2 to 4 ft of inundation across the Pine Orchard Section of Branford.

Along <u>Seaview Avenue</u> several houses were flooded out with up to 6 ft or surge.(1000-1100am 8/28/2011)

At 10.2 FT MLLW / 3.5 ft MHHW (10/27/2018)

Due to the astronomically high tides coming off the October 24th full moon, and generally 2 1/2 to 3 1/2 ft of surge from Easterly Gale to Storm force winds ramping up Friday Night into Saturday afternoon. This was the second tide of this event, so tidal piling was a definite factor as well, with 5 to 7 ft waves on LI Sound.

Milford - Several incidences of street flooding. One street in particular, Field Court had approximately 4' of water (as determined by photos of inundated autos. Field Court parallels Long Island Sound, with one row of houses and a sand beach separating. Field Court is low lying and experiences regular flooding during lunar high tides (typically 6"-12"), But this time the Sound overtopped the beach. It also overtopped Bayview Beach with the waters running westerly along Bayshore Drive then southerly along Westland Avenue to join the flood waters at Field Court.

Significant flooding around <u>Bayview Beach</u> with 3-4 ft of water on some roads near the beach (credit report and pic to WTNH).



<u>West Haven</u> - <u>Spring Street</u> near the West Haven-New Haven line and the West River flooded and was closed, with the occupants of one car needing assistance to get out

New Haven - Flooding at the Middletown Avenue Bridge, where we frequently get flooding.

<u>East Haven</u> - <u>Cosey Beach Avenue was flooded in parts from First Avenue to Phillip Street</u>, as was the perennial flood zone at Shore Beach Road where it meets Hemingway and Coe avenues

<u>Branford</u> - Several areas were impassable, included <u>Sybil and Linden avenues near Lenny's</u>, <u>Arc Road off Tabor Drive</u>, the <u>South Montowese bridge</u> and two bridges in the Stony Creek section along Thimble Island Road and Leetes Island Road.

Indian Neck section of town had water on <u>Rt 146 near Linden Shores Ave (about 1.5-2 feet of water) near the Lenny's Restaurant.</u>

Stony Creek had flooding downtown near the Post Office (credit report and pic to WTNH).



Guilford- Rt 146 was closed with 2ft of swiftly flowing water by Meadow St

<u>Madison</u> - A little water over some coastal streets. One road closed.

<u>Westbrook</u> - Significant flooding around the <u>town beach and harbor</u>. <u>Old Mail Trail</u>, was closed. (credit report and pic to WTNH).








Old Mail Trail and adjacent properties in Westbrook inundated by 1 ft of water (12/23/2022)





<u>Guilford</u> – (5 ft waves on se flow) Minimum flooding observed at <u>the Rt. 146 causeway over the West River</u>, approximately 45 minutes after high tide. Some flooding noted on <u>Old Quarry Road</u>. Using Old Quarry Road as a proxy, probable flooding at <u>railroad underpass on Rt. 146 west at Guilford Branford boarder</u>, and a couple of dips on <u>Rt 146 east of Stony Creek</u>.
