
Heavy Snow, Feb. 23-24, 2003

This heavy snow event occurred mainly over southwest Indiana, southern Illinois, and northern parts of southeast Missouri. Four to eight inches of snow fell within 8 hours. Visibility was one quarter mile or less during the heaviest snow bursts. The heavy snowfall rates were accompanied by thunder and lightning in a few spots. Thunder was observed at the Paducah National Weather Service during a snow shower. The precipitation fell mainly as rain across western Kentucky, limiting accumulations to less than an inch along the Ohio River, and nothing near the Tennessee border. The heavy snow was caused by an intense upper level disturbance that moved east-northeast from Oklahoma. The surface low pressure system tracked northeast from Arkansas into south central Kentucky during the night of February 23. The snowfall graphic below shows general accumulations across the area. Some amounts were locally higher or lower than indicated on the map. See the listing below for specific reports by location.



The following are accumulations of sleet, snow, and ice reported mostly by cooperative observers, spotters, and emergency managers.
